**To Honor Capt. White at Port Orford**

On Saturday evening, October 28, Port Orford will open its doors to the largest gathering of Masons in the history of Curry county. From nearly every section of Oregon and northern California they are coming to pay their respects to the oldest Mason in the world in point of years of membership.

Willis T. White, Sr., was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason in Lewy's Island Lodge, No. 138, A. F. & A. M., Princeton, Maine, January 17, 1867, and has been active in the Masonic fraternity for 71 years.

On October 29, Mr. White will have reached his 83rd birthday. In 1918 he demitted and became a charter member of the Port Orford lodge, the most western Masonic lodge in the United States. He was its first secretary and served the lodge in that capacity for seven years. Willis T. White has been a resident of Curry county for 67 years, spending 35 years in the southern part of the county and the past 32 years a resident of Port Orford.

Grand Lodge officers will be present from both California and Oregon, including the worshipful grand masters from the two states.

The Masons will convene at the Masonic hall at 8:00 p. m. and march to the building joining the Western Cafe where the festivities will take place.
