### John M. Stahl Tops All His Past Triumphs In "Letter Of Introduction" at Roxy Sun.

Prominent Director Adds Comedy Touch To His Latest Hit

Noted for his great and moving tragedies of the screen, John M. Stahl has turned his talents comedy-wards. More comedy than he has inserted in any one of his previous pictures is included in his latest, "Letter of Introduction," scheduled to be shown at the Roxy Theatre Sunday, Monday and Tuesday. While this picture contains all the stirring heart-pull, dramatic-punch and glowing romance of his former screen masterpieces, the prominent role played by Charlie McCarthy in the cast accounts for the preponderance of laughs in this production.

Heading the cast are Adolphe Menjou, Andrea Leeds, Edgar Bergen with the inimitable Charlie McCarthy, and George Murphy. As the story embraces incidents in Bergen's rise to fame with McCarthy, excellent comedy opportunities were offered in its development.

Because of the unique style of comedy employed by Bergen and Charlie,

most of the incidents dealing with the pair, and practically all of the dialogue between the two, was written by Bergen and McCarthy as a lighter comedy constructionist and writer.

The story presents Bergen, as a struggling ventriloquist, who, through meeting Menjou, is started on his road to success and fame. The Bergen-McCarthy sequences in swanky New York night clubs, his gradual rise to fame, and his ultimate success in radio.

Several other comedy sequences, between Menjou, Murphy, Andrea Leeds, Rita Johnson and Eve Arden, are spotted through the production. Stahl is known for his direction of such pictures as "Back Street," "Magnificent Obsession," "Imitation of Life"—all with fairly heavy dramatic, even tragic, themes. "Letter of Introduction" marks his departure into a new field of directorial endeavor.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the City of Coquille, a municipal corporation of Coos County, State of Oregon, pursuant to the provisions of Section 56-2004, Oregon Code 1930 as amended, and provisions of Section thirty-three to thirty-eight, both inclusive, of an act enacted by the people of the State of Oregon in the year 1913, said provisions being known as the Bancroft Bonding act, and by virtue of an ordinance passed and adopted by the Common Council on the 17th day of October, 1938, whereby the Common

Council of said City was duly authorized to issue and sell improvement bonds for the construction of a sewer system on Eleventh Street east of Holly Street for a distance of 393 feet, all in the City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon, to the amount of \$401.50, and that by reason thereof sealed, written proposals for the purchase of said improvement bonds, or any thereof, will be received at the office of the City Recorder until 5 o'clock P. M. on the 7th day of November, 1938, and that said bids will be opened, and considered by the Council at a session held on said date at 7:30 o'clock P. M. at the Council Chambers in said City; said bonds will be designated as "improvement bonds Series N-1," and bond No. 1 will be for the sum of \$101.50, and bonds No. Two to Three inclusive will be for the sum of \$150.00 each, all of said bonds will bear interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum from the date thereof, and said bonds will be sold to the highest bidder for not less than par and accrued interest and said bonds will be dated the 1st day of November, 1938, and will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America. **Ballot Measures Analyzed**

**Amendment Legalizing Certain Lotteries and Other Forms of Gambling**

This, the twelfth and last of the ballot measures to be analyzed in this series, is a proposed amendment to the state constitution under which the state would have the exclusive right to license certain lotteries and other forms of gambling.

The measure provides for licensing, taxing and regulating bowling alleys, bridge studios, pool and billiard rooms, shooting galleries, horse racing, dog racing and other forms of racing; and racing establishments conducted under the mutual or other wagering systems; bank nights; punchboards; pin ball games; vending machines and raffles and bazaars conducted by churches or other organizations for charitable purposes.

As a sugar coating to the measure, it is provided that the bulk of the revenue realized from licenses and fees collected under its provisions shall be used in financing old age pensions. The legislature would be authorized to apportion not to exceed 40 per cent of the license money to the city or county in which the revenue originates and another not more than ten per cent to the support of public fairs or exhibitions.
