

### Moody Report Shows Bill 316 To Be A Needed Law

"The report of Ralph E. Moody, special prosecutor for the state in connection with Oregon's reign of labor terrorism; to Governor Martin confirms every contention advanced by the farmers of Oregon in behalf of their initiative measure to liberate Oregon from labor union gangsterism and racketeering," declares H. L. Shoemaker, president of the Associated Farmers of Oregon, in a statement released to the press commenting on the report.

"It substantiates the charge made by the sponsors of this initiative measure that Dave Beck, czar of the Teamsters International in 11 western states and his lieutenant, Al Rosser, boss of the Portland Teamsters Union, entered into a conspiracy to control the destiny of labor and industry in Oregon, and in furtherance of this conspiracy Rosser and his hand-picked henchmen resorted to nearly every conceivable kind of violence and vandalism.

"It substantiates our charge that Rosser had absolute control of the expenditure of more than half a million dollars of the earnings of the rank and file of the union he dominated, and that considerable of this money was expended in excessive salaries and bonuses to his henchmen, to keep up workers, bomb and burn property and to otherwise violate our criminal laws.

"It substantiates our charges that Rosser, who was recently convicted for conspiracy in burning down a mill in Salem, lived in luxury, spending money far in excess of his salary in buying a farm, pedigreed stock, race horses, and in the settlement of his domestic difficulties, while the members of the unions he controlled struggled to eke out an existence.

"It substantiates our charge that union funds were used to provide bail for Rosser's gangsters and to employ high-priced lawyers to defend them in our courts.

"It substantiates our charge that in furtherance of the Beck-Rosser conspiracy, the latter undertook to fix the prices for beer in the Portland area, to fix prices for the parking of automobiles, to fix prices for laundries, and to fix prices for Portland bakeries, and to police these business enterprises with his gangsters to the end that all competition would be eliminated.

"The report substantiates our contention that there is an absolute need of additional legislation to protect the rank and file of union labor from further raids on their treasury by labor bosses and racketeers, to prevent industry from being driven into bankruptcy by labor bosses and racketeers, and finally to protect the public from the blockading of trade and commerce by the self same labor bosses and racketeers.

"There are some fundamentals that inexperience has deprived our boys of," he said, "and if we do not click on these points, we will be defeated." Although the locals are heavier, they do not have the speed and especially the speed of Susick and Kelley in the ball toting ranks.

There were no injuries reported in either game. The squads are expected to be in tip-top shape for the encounter.

Cosch Vic Adams, of the Bulldog team, in an interview Wednesday was also quite pessimistic about his chances Saturday and pointed out the heavier line and the fine material Coach Leslie had developed over here. As far as Susick, the star of the team, he said that little can be expected of such a man when he would be watched and marked so closely by an opponent.

On a statistical basis, figures favor North Bend as the charging backs of that team have gained considerable more yardage against teams Coquille has played this season. And North Bend has also played two of the strongest outfits in the state, in Cottage Grove and Grants Pass, and has been the winner each time.

### Unemployment Payments, Coos-Curry Total \$337,195

Lumber and timber products workers received 85 per cent of the \$284,597 paid in unemployment compensation benefits under the state law in Coos and Curry counties up to August 1.

This conclusion was based upon a survey by the commission's research and statistical department and released here by Harry L. Kuck, informational representative. Since the survey was completed the benefit total distributed through the Marshfield employment office has reached \$337,195.

Wholesale and retail trade workers received 2.9 per cent; contract construction help, 2.4 per cent; and the food manufacturing group, 1.2 per cent.

Original claims filed in the Marshfield office have diminished steadily. The August average was 44 per week, Kuck said, against about 200 per week at the peak period, and continued claims now average only 597 per week as against 2489 in April.

Contributions were paid on 16 per cent more payrolls in Coos county during 1937 than in 1936, according to the survey. The 1937 total was \$7,351,974, as against \$6,272,018 in 1936. July was the top month in 1937, with \$1,200,000, and January, 1937, was the low month of the two-year period.

Distribution of reconciled checks by major industrial groups showed the following participation in benefits under the state law:

- Mining and quarrying, \$13.55; contract construction, \$6,713; food manufacturing, \$3,551; textile mill products, \$242,681; printing, allied trades, \$403; miscellaneous manufacturing, \$1,660; interstate railroads, \$3,038; transportation other than water, \$1,611; water transportation, other services, \$2,302; telephone, telegraph, related services, \$205; utilities, \$1,790; wholesale, retail trade, \$8,246; automobile sales, services, \$3,401; insurance carriers, brokers, \$23; real estate, allied business, \$197; hotels, eating places, \$2,585; personal services, \$1,995; business services, \$1,669; amusement, recreation, \$757; miscellaneous services and enterprises, \$295.
