That the crowd which attended the wrestling card in the Community Building here last Friday evening would like to see the promoter, Harry Elliott, in action, was loudly attested during the evening. During an intermission in the first bout, Pat O'Dowdy, the current meanie of wrestling crop, had not showed up for his boxing bout with Elton Owens, and Harry had it announced that he would take on one of the other wrestlers appearing on the card, for the final. The large crowd whooped its approval but were doomed to disappointment, for O'Dowdy showed up in the dressing room in time to make his spectacular "kiss the canvas" act with Elton Owens as the final, instead of the semi-final as advertised. He received a terrific punch to the jaw in the second round of their four-round affair and Referee Elliott could have counted for ten minutes before the Oklahoman could get enough stiffness in his legs to stand.

The two wrestling bouts made it the best card to have been shown here in many moons, that is the fans got more kick out of them than usual. In what was to have been the main event, Chief Joseph Eagle was too heavy for Walt Achlu, taking the 10. Achlu took the second in 13.

The chief is quite well educated and before entering on his muscle-twisting activities gave a ten-minute talk to the crowd on the origin and history of North American Indians. They are not Indians, the chief proclaimed, but might be called "Red-men."

He won the first with a throat chopper hold which he calls the tommyhawk. All during the match he displayed some of the most adroit foot wrestling ever seen on a mat anywhere. The Indian outfoxed Achlu for the final fall in four and one-half minutes, using a full leg Nelson.

In the preliminary, Sammy Evans, newcomer from Montana, took the first fall from Jose Rodriguez in 23 minutes of rough action. Jose took the second in 13 and the bout was declared a draw on the close of the 45-minute period.

This Evans is a husky, tricky wrestler, whom the crowd will appreciate seeing here again. He lost two out of three falls to Harry Elliott in the Monday night card in Portland this week.

The enthusiastic response that Harry Elliott got when he offered to wrestle anyone the crowd would pick was a surprise to many. Some of the fans wanted to get up a petition for Elliott to wrestle and have the Coquille Wrestling commission promote the match. Elliott said that he was willing and, if the petition is forthcoming, fans will probably soon find an answer to the question, "Can Elliott wrestle?"
