Every Purchase Is A Taxable Transaction

Advocates of the 2 per cent transaction tax for a "citizens' retirement annuity" plan in Oregon, state that a transaction tax hits "newspaper advertising, the telephone company, and all big business," to quote from their argument in the voters' pamphlet.

By an organization that specializes in analysis of taxation proposals, we are reminded that every sale or purchase in Oregon, no matter how large as how small, is taxable as a "transaction," and that a transaction tax is really a multiple, pyramiding sales tax on a sales tax.

Box shock, fertilizer, food, rent, candy, medicine, insurance premiums, transportation costs, dentists' fees, interest from mortgages, fire insurance settlement, tractors, milk cans, automobiles, farm machinery are all taxable when bought or sold in Oregon under a transaction tax. Furthermore, many wholesalers and some retailers who ship some merchandise into other states, will have to keep separate books, since interstate transactions are exempt, it is pointed out.

Interest or rent received by a widow from mortgages or other income on account of her husband's life insurance, cannot be classed as "big business." Yet her income from investments would be taxed two per cent in addition to the Oregon eight per cent intangible tax.

Oregon farmers who produce apples, wheat, berries, flax, or who raise turkeys, wool, livestock, the prices of which are fixed by general market conditions, would be hit harder than any other one group, it is said. Farmers cannot pass along the two per cent tax as can some merchants, doctors, abstractors, auto repairmen. A two per cent transaction tax therefore, would be a tax on gross receipts of the farmer-producer, whether he had any net profit or not.

That living costs will go up, incomes will go down, many wholesale merchants will go out of business, retailers will lose business to out-of-state mail order houses, interest rates will increase, new capital will stay out of Oregon, property taxes will increase due to abandonment of farms and business made unprofitable by the two per cent tax, is as sure as that the sun still shines.

Nor is this transaction tax the Townsend plan. Dr. Townsend says it cannot be done in one state. It must be a federal tax to be really feasible.
