The 1933 Christmas seals will make their appearance Thanksgiving day when the annual sale is launched in Coos county. Although this is the 32nd sale of Christmas seals in the United States, in order to have a complete collection, including this year's the collector must have thirty-six varieties of design. There were two designs in 1907, the first year, and four in 1913.

The Seal this year is especially artistic, showing a mother and her two children in costumes of the Victorian era lighting a Christmas candle in the window.

On this year's sheets of Christmas seals, the four corner stamps are different—portraits of pioneers in tuberculosis history. A special pane or souvenir sheet of the four corner seals with one regular Christmas seal is a new collector's item. Artistically printed in color and enclosed in a special envelope, each pane with five seals sells for twenty-five cents. Funds from these panes also will go toward the support of the year-round tuberculosis programs in the communities where the seals are sold. Another feature of interest this year is the use of two double-barred crosses instead of one. The only other seals which have carried two double-barred crosses were those for 1919 and 1923. These panes may be purchased from Mrs. William H. Barrow, county Christmas Seal chairman, Coquille, Oregon.
