As a young man, he often expressed the wish to travel all over the world and was rewarded by a legacy from a relative with the specific request he use all the money to travel. He has served as an interpreter among the savages and told of interesting situations among the natives, their customs and modes of living. He and three other white men came in contact with a village of pygmies and, not knowing their tongue, nearly lost their lives before they could make the small folk realize they were friendly. Dr. Stephensen had several snapshots of natives of foreign countries, their places of worship, etc., which were very interesting.
