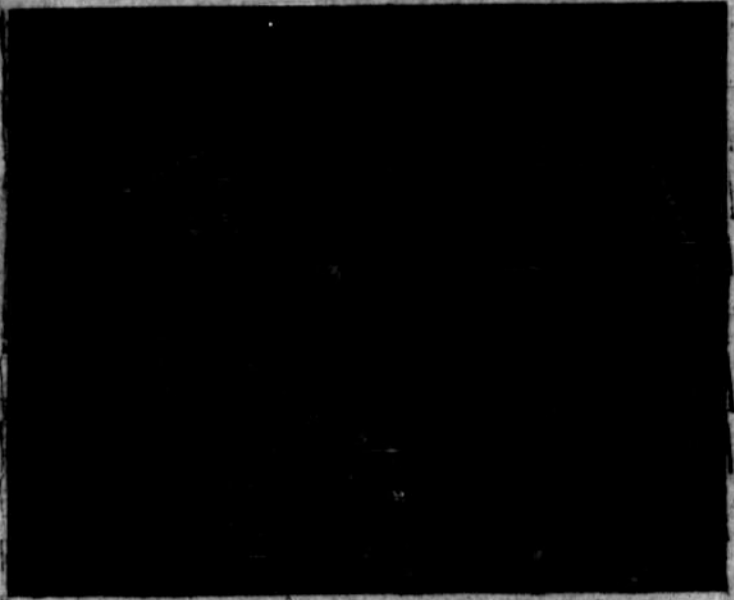

### Bible Sunday At Church of Christ

This year the churches are celebrating the printing of the Bible or portions of it in one thousand and eight different languages.

Bible Sunday will be observed by the Church of Christ, morning and night, with appropriate services. At 9:45 a. m., there will be special features in the Bible School session. The goal for this service is 200 people and 200 Bibles present. There were 189 present last Sunday.

At 7:30 p. m. there will be given to each attendant three booklets. One of the three will be of sixteen pages, with illustrations and with John three-sixteen printed in twenty-one different languages. There will be an exhibit of twenty-four cards, containing portions of the Bible in as many different languages. The choir will sing "The Old Book and the Old Faith" and one other number. The solo, "The Bible Christian," will be sung. There will be an exhibit of unique Bibles. All who have old, small, large, foreign or unique ones in any way are requested to bring them. The public is invited. Sermon: "The Bible in Miniature."

### Tabernacle Observes Bible Sunday, Dec. 11

Universal Bible Sunday, which falls on Dec. 11, next Sunday, and commemorates the translation of the Bible into more than 1000 tongues, will be observed with special messages and musical numbers at the Gospel Tabernacle (Assembly of God). The theme for the day will be "Civilization or Evangelization?" The morning message will concern itself with the Bible directly as a living, vital force. The evening service will answer these questions: "What is the vital difference between the two terms, Civilization and Evangelization?" "Has 'Civilization' been so successful among us that we can complacently offer it to other less 'enlightened' peoples?" "What, if anything, has civilization done for you?" "What benefits do you enjoy which are the direct influence of the Bible?" Everyone is asked to carry his or her Bible to church both morning and evening. A count of Bibles will be taken at each service.
