Trend of benefit payments for unemployed insured Oregon workers is up again.

Completion of the November report by the state unemployment compensation commission shows an increase of 30 per cent over October distribution. Total for the month was \$305,066, distributed over 29,109 checks, and this brought the cumulative total for 1933 to \$5,539,107.
