### 16,000 Accidents Due To Road Hogging

Oregon accident statistics are eloquent concerning the road hog's contribution to traffic mishaps in this state, according to figures from the office of Secretary of State Snell. This tendency on the part of some drivers to pay too little attention to their car's position, or to trespass upon a portion of the roadway to which another driver is entitled, is reflected in the following excerpts from last year's Oregon traffic accident summary:

Number of drivers not having right-of-way, 9,763.

Number of drivers on wrong side of road, 3,763.

Number of drivers cutting in, 2,747.

wrong side of the road or straddles the yellow line is not the only offender among the road hogs. Much of the difficulty is created by persons whose minds simply are not on their driving. With their attention focused on the scenery or on some interesting day-dream, they permit their cars to wander slowly from one lane into another, making it almost impossible for cars behind them to pass.

Also in the "road-hog" class is the

driver who is perpetually in a hurry. If there is a long line of cars ahead of him he tries to pass all the cars at once, making plentiful use of his horn in doing so. Not only does he expose himself to serious risk, but he deprives other drivers of a rightful chance to pass and deserves the censure which they mentally heap upon him.

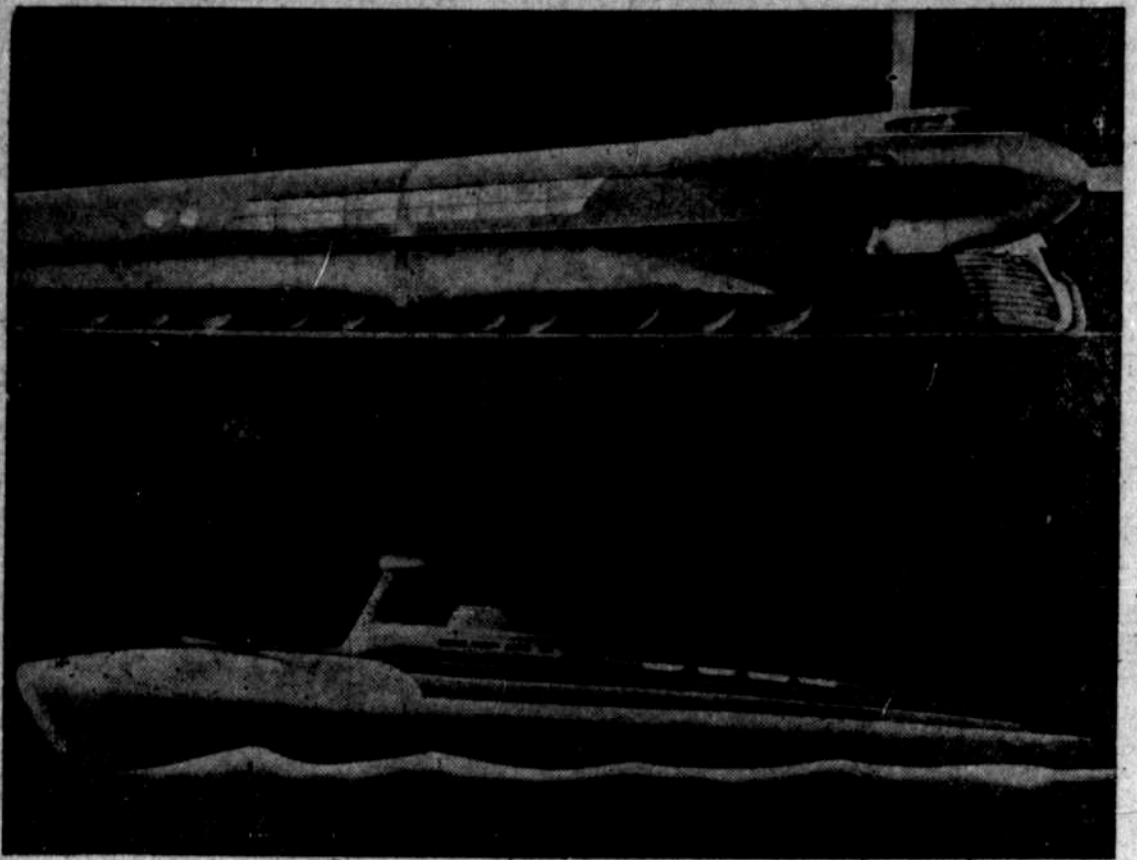
