Chamber of Commerce Talks About Community Chest

The board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce at the Tuesday noon session voted to contribute up to \$35 toward the \$90 estimate of what is needed to provide half a pint of milk each school day until next May for the undernourished children, those who do not have milk with their lunch. The Lions club has also contributed \$30 and it thought that some other club or other organization will also co-operate.

Another matter discussed was that of a community chest, although the general opinion was that a chest did not work out satisfactorily in towns under 10,000 in population.

Red Cross funds allocated in Coquille—one-half of the \$200 realized from the membership drive—have already been exhausted, and there are numerous calls every day for relief.

The directors made no recommendation that Coquille provide a community chest, but they all realize that some provision must be made to relieve suffering and distress, especially among children, and that the demands this winter will be far in excess of what the county may be able to satisfy.

The question of aiding in the turbing of Athletic Park was also discussed, but it was decided to let that matter wait until the membership campaign for 1934 has been made and it is learned how much funds will be available.
