Semester Ends
The current week is the last one of the semester at Riverton. Wednesday and Thursday the six weeks examinations were given. The finals will be on Friday, January 13.

Dinner is Served
The home economics I class prepared a dinner for the home economics class today (Thursday). Both classes are under the direction of Miss Nye.

Home Ec Field Trip
Miss Nye conducted a field trip last week to a butcher shop in Coquille. The girls had spent several days studying various kinds of meats and cuts. Harold Dey, of the Economy Cash Market, cut up a quarter of beef for the class and explained which part of the animal the various cuts came from and how to distinguish the meat of one animal from that of another.

Ping Pong and Tennis
The girls' physical education class expects to play tennis and ping pong for the next few weeks. The boys in the Smith-Hughes department have built tables out of rough lumber and have covered the tops with light veneer. The gym is being lined for a tennis court. While part of the group play tennis, the remainder will play ping pong in the balcony of the gym.

Basketball
In order to allow all boys in school to participate in athletics, Mr. Robinson has divided the 27 boys into three groups. The first division is for the boys who are expected to be first or second team material for the school's basketball team. This group reports for practice every day. The second and third divisions report every other day. In this way, it is possible to give the team the maximum amount of practice without slighting the physical education requirements of the state course of study which requires only two periods of physical education per week.

Diphtheria Test
Shick tests for diphtheria are being given Thursday to all those pupils who turn in the printed requests for tests and immunization which were sent out to all parents. The county health department definitely refuses to treat children without the parents' written consent. Next Tuesday, Jan. 17, a check will be made to determine those who have positive reactions. Those who react positively will be given immunization at that time if requested by the parents. Many of the Riverton children were immunized three years ago when the test was given to the pupils of the schools.

Business Training
As a second semester in the consumer's course, Mr. Robinson is allowing those who took bookkeeping the first semester to choose between bookkeeping II and business training the second semester. About one-half the students are taking the business training course. Mr. Robinson will teach the new course also.
