place will be announced later. Mayor Milne's proclamation follows:

The Boy Scouts of America, incorporated February 8, 1910, and chartered by Congress June 15, 1916, have during the past twenty-nine years rendered notable service to the nation. They have done effective work in this community and throughout the country.

Nearly one and one-half million persons are now enrolled and during the years practically 8,000,000 individuals through the various branches of Scouting, have enjoyed adventure, hiking, camping, swimming, woodcraft, handicraft, fellowship, health and safety; have learned how to be helpful to others and have been trained to be participating citizens.

During the week of February 8th to 14th the Boy Scouts of America will celebrate their twenty-ninth anniversary.

Therefore, I, Ralph F. Milne, Mayor of the City of Coquille, do hereby recommend that the citizens of this city observe the Boy Scout Week for the purpose of strengthening the work of the Boy Scouts of America.

I earnestly recommend that our civic organizations, our churches, and our schools co-operate in carrying out a program for the definite recognition and effective work of the Boy Scouts of America, in order that the work of the Boy Scout Program may be extended to an increasing proportion of the boyhood of our city and adjacent communities.

Farm Debt Plan Aid To Creditors

Creditors of farmers as well as farm debtors are eligible for Farm Security Administration debt adjustment services, according to Dale E. Winn, county FSA supervisor, 201 Laird Building, Coquille. Equitable settlement of outstanding debts can often be effected through confidential and friendly negotiations between the creditors and debtor involved.

Many creditors have been spared the cost of expensive foreclosure proceedings, the difficulty of finding suitable tenants for their lands, and the often hopeless task of securing payment on old obligations. Impartial review and negotiations sponsored by the debt adjustment service have made this possible.

Meanwhile the farm operator involved, with a working relationship already established with the creditor can continue his operations on a sound basis and again assume a just debt burden. Consolidation, refinancing, extensions and adjustments result in restoring the farmer's capacity to pay and enable him to continue established farming operations.

Reaching a basis on which the creditors can again realize a reasonable return from his investment and the debtor can meet his obligations not only aids the two parties involved but eventually contributes to the welfare of the entire community. Similarly the county government benefits in that payment of back taxes is considered in nearly every adjustment.

County voluntary debt adjustment committees cooperate with the FSA supervisors in laying out plans for adjustment in many cases. Requests for debt adjustment aid should be made directly to the county supervisor.
