## Coquille Testers Now At Work

Dairymen in the Coquille river valley and northern Curry county will have an opportunity of having herds tested for butterfat production during 1939 on the same basis as last year, according to action taken at the annual meeting of the association held in Coquille recently. Vernon Trigg, of Norway and William Sweet, of Bandon, were employed as testers for 1939 and are now in the field contacting dairymen and making arrangements for next year's testing. Don Auer, who has served the association as tester for the past three years, resigned this position to take up other work.

Hillis Perkins, of Bandon, was re-elected to serve as president of the association during 1939. Verne Lundy, of Myrtle Point, was elected vice president and Joe Nilsen, of Riverton, re-elected secretary-treasurer. Others elected to serve on the board of directors with the three officers include W. E. Cross, of Coquille; Leonard Peterson, of Coquille; W. H. Donald, of Broadbent, and M. M. Schmidt, of Norway.

The cow testing association, according to the directors, is maintained to provide an opportunity for all dairymen in the area who care to do so, to obtain the services of the tester to keep production records on the herd during the year. It is a co-operative plan of record keeping and all dairymen who may not have been contacted by the testers may arrange to have their herd included in the association by contacting either tester, any of the directors or leave word at the county agent's office. The cost of testing is \$1.00 per cow per year for the regular association work and \$1.25 per cow per year where permanent records are maintained for each cow tested. In addition to these amounts, each dairyman pays a membership fee of \$1.50 which provides a fund for paying costs incidental to testing.

## "New Oregon Trail" To Be Shown Here

Arrangements for showing the State Highway commission's film, "The New Oregon Trail," in Salem, Portland, Coquille, and other cities of Oregon at early date are being worked out by the travel department of the commission. The motion picture, a two-reel film, depicts the outstanding recreational and scenic spots of the state.

Descriptive voice on the film will be that of Alois Havrilla, one of the nation's foremost radio broadcast voices. Musical background is supplied by a nationally famous orchestra.

The film will be run continuously in the Oregon exhibit building at the Golden Gate International Exposition, starting February 18. In addition arrangements have been made for national circulation throughout the United States to audiences totaling 500,000 before June 1. Comprehensive booklets covering the attractions Oregon offers the vacationist will be distributed in connection with the showings of the picture.

The Highway commission expects the film to be instrumental in substantially increasing travel from other states to Oregon this year.

"The New Oregon Trail" was produced under direction of the Highway commission by Castle Films, Inc. Charles Piper, of Portland, did the photography.
