Coquille In Traffic Safety Contest

The city of Coquille officially girded itself for intensified warfare against traffic accidents today when Mayor R. F. Milne signed a statement entering the city in the 1939 community traffic safety contest being sponsored by Secretary of State Earl Snell.

From now until December 31st, Coquille will be in direct competition with 16 other cities of 2,000 to 5,000 population. The winning city will be the one which makes the most improvement, month by month, over its traffic accident record for the last eight months of 1938. Awards will also be given to the cities which have the best traffic safety programs for the remainder of the year.

Each city in Oregon which numbered more than 1000 inhabitants in 1930 will be entered in one of the four divisions of the contest, provided that the mayor or head of the local safety council signs an entry blank. All records and computing of standings will be done in the secretary of state's office, where traffic accident records from all parts of the state are kept.

A set of handsome highway plaques, designating the city as the 1939 safety award winner, will be given to the leading city in each division from the standpoint of accident improvement. The plaques will be suitable for placing on standards at the main highway entrances to the city, and will stand as permanent records of the city's safety achievements during the next eight months.

Standings will be computed separately for each month, so that a city which has an outstanding record except for one or two bad months will not be unduly penalized.

"It is our hope that this contest will lead every driver in Oregon to take a more direct and personal interest in traffic safety," Snell declared. "By seeing monthly reports of their cities' standings, motorists will have a better appreciation of the problems and progress of traffic safety in their own communities."

Announcement of the winning cities will be made as soon as the traffic accident summary for 1939 has been completed next January. Presentation of the plaques and of the awards for safety activity will follow as soon as they can be made up.

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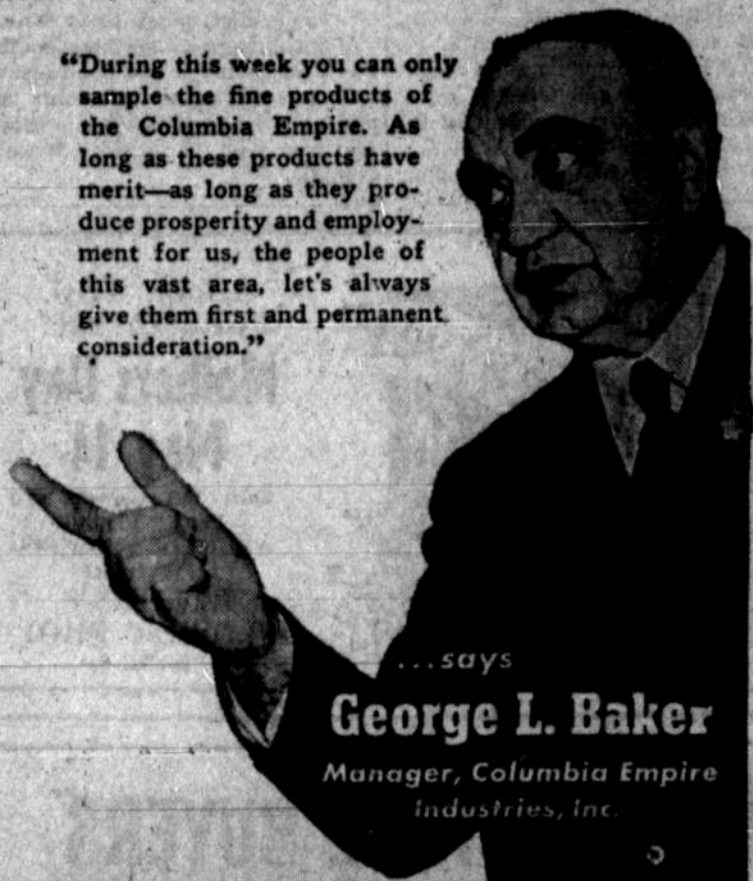
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Mothers To Be Honor Guests At University of Oregon
