Frank Culver who was very ill for a few days last week, is much better now and able to be out again, though not fully recovered yet.

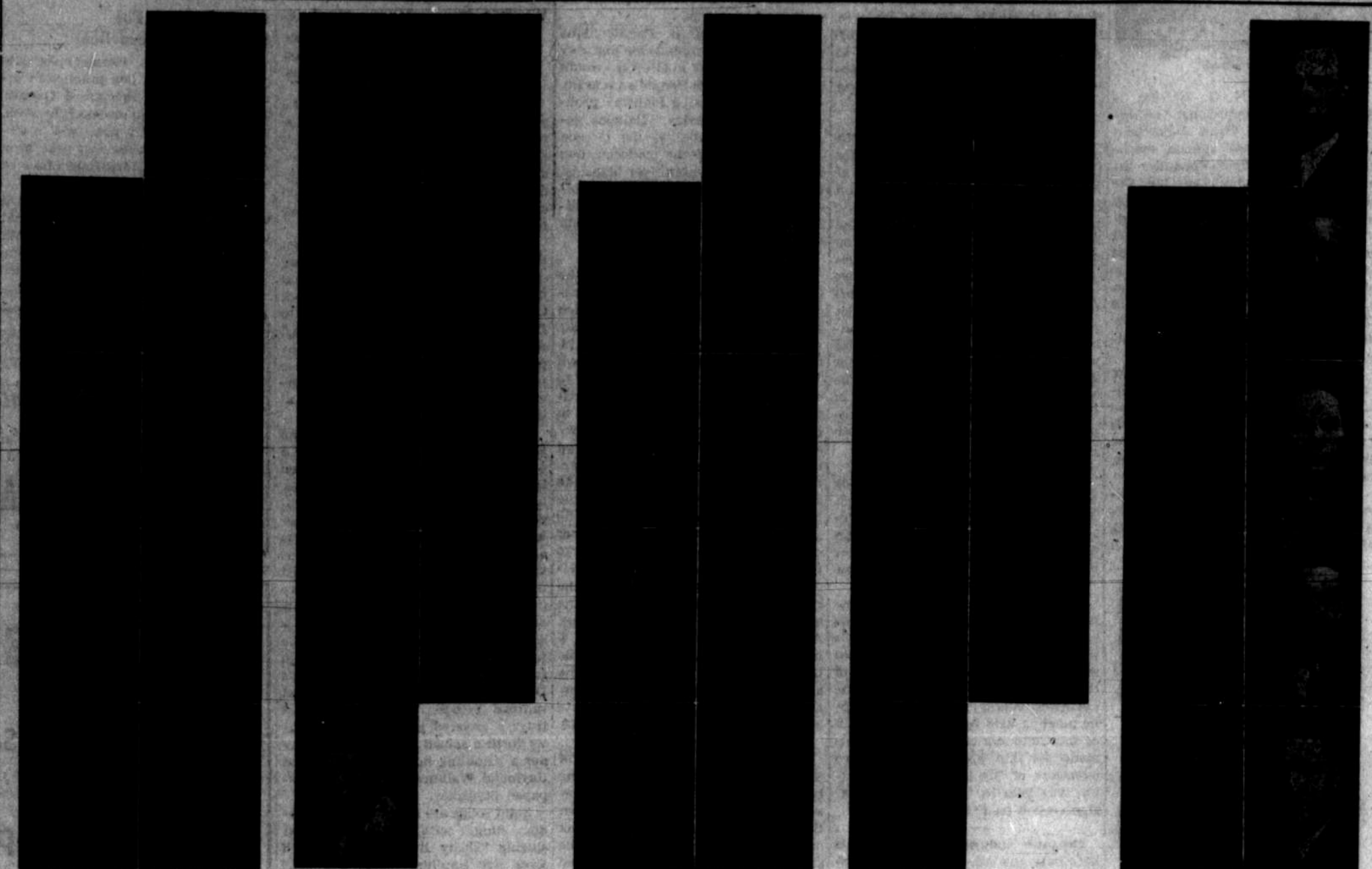
