

Coos County At Top In Improvement

Coos, Benton and Klamath counties stood at the head of their respective county groups in traffic accident improvement records for the month of April, it was announced by Earl Snell, secretary of state, today.

Rankings are computed on the basis of improvement shown for April of this year over April of last year in number of accidents, number of injuries and number of fatalities.

Coos county moved into first place from second in Group II while Benton stood first in Group I for the third consecutive month as did Klamath county in Group III.

Traffic deaths showed a 40 per cent improvement in April of this year over April of 1938, Mr. Snell's figures showed. Total accidents decreased slightly as did total injuries.

Any woman may enter this contest by sending in a menu with recipes for each item on the menu for a noon or evening meal in which eggs are the principal ingredient of the main dish. The menus and recipes must be sent in to Julia Bennett, Coquille, Oregon, before June 10, so that all entries may be judged in Corvallis and the five winning sets can be sent on to the seventh would's poultry congress and exposition which will be held in July, where the winner will receive \$1000 in cash. The basis for making the awards will be on general appearance, workmanship, nutritive value of the menu, and originality.

The next birthday party will be held on June 14 at LaVerne Park to honor the birthdays of Bernice Clausen, Mabel Martin and Josephine Royce.

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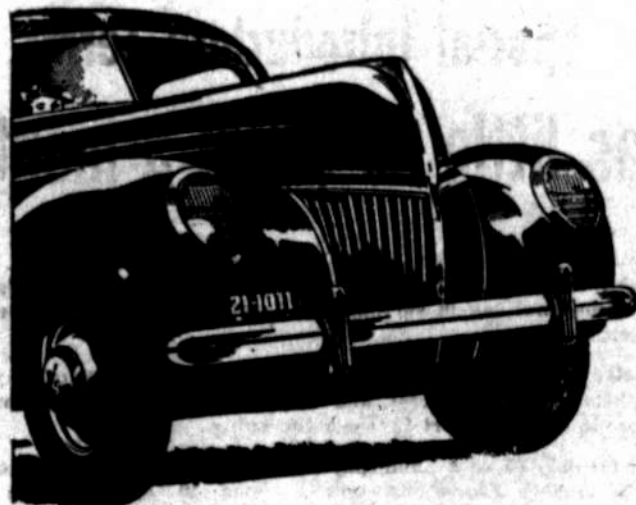
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
