### ALL DOG OWNERS ATTENTION!

Tuesday, June 20, has been set as the deadline for payment of 1939 dog licenses in Coos county without penalty. After that date a penalty of \$1 per dog becomes effective.

Also after that date all owners who have not paid their 1939 fees will be liable for prosecution. District Attorney Ben C. Flaxel has notified us he will prosecute all persons whose names are given him as owing dog licenses. The dog board has legal opinions that persons who owe the license fees and who do not pay may be brought into justice courts by the district attorney. Upon conviction, they will become liable for the fee, the penalty, and the court costs in addition. Regular license fees in effect until the penalty date are: males and spayed females, \$1; females, \$1.50.

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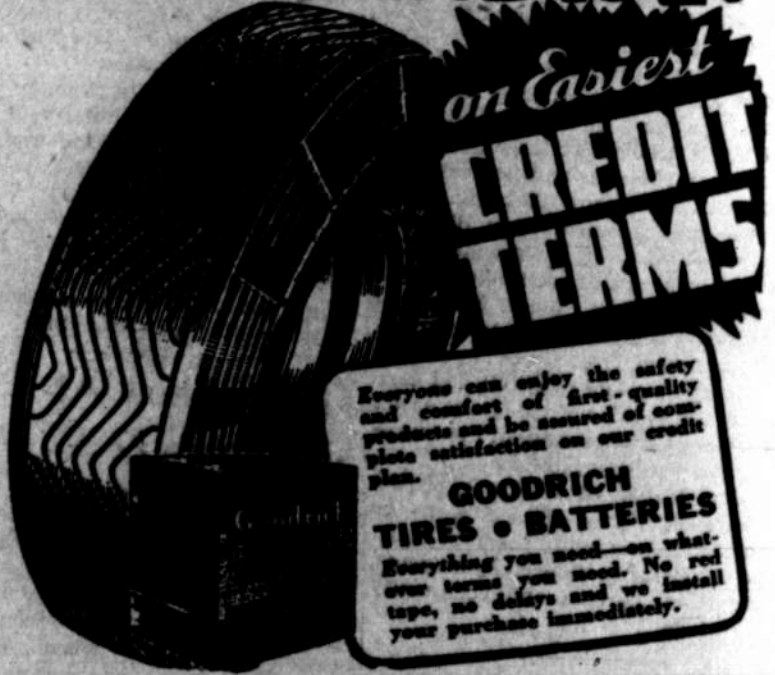
