Claterbos Tells Of Alaskan Trip

President Harry L. Claterbos gave a very interesting report on his recent trip to Alaska at the chamber of commerce luncheon Tuesday noon. One of the things which was impressed on him as never before was the immensity of this northwest possession of the United States which is about twice the size of the state of Texas.

The four American towns the Rotarians visited—Ketchikan, Wrangell, awake hustling young cities, Juneau with 6500 population, Ketchikan with 6,000 and Petersburg about 1,000. All except Wrangell are well built, well-cared for cities, each with an attraction for the traveler.

Fishing is the big industry of the territory, the industry bringing in an income of 42 million dollars a year, but mining is not far behind. And the population of Alaska is only 80,000, 30,000 being natives.

Mr. Claterbos touched on the glaciers of blue ice, the variation of 24 feet in the tides along the coast, the fact that but two hours of the trip from Seattle to Juneau was over open water, the inland passage being the only one used.

Juneau has no air connection with Seattle, although daily service is maintained between Juneau and Fairbanks which requires five and one-half days to travel by rail and water.

The copper mines are largely closed in the territory but gold is still being mined. In the big plant at Juneau, the rock being crushed yields but 91 cents a ton, but with the gravity system for passing the rock through the crushers, the cost of recovering the gold has been cut down to 71 cents a ton. About 8,000 tons a day pass through the plant.

Besides the pleasure features of the trip Mr. Claterbos said it was very educational.

Buzz Navigates "Hell's Canyon"

The group left Coquille, Ore., on the Pacific coast, 26 days ago and spent half the time since then battling their way 200 miles up the turbulent Snake from Lewiston, Idaho, to Weiser.

At times they were walled in by mountains that towered 7000 feet above them.

They expect to leave Wednesday or Thursday to continue their journey up the Snake river to Yellowstone park, thence by portage across the Continental divide to the headwaters of the Yellowstone river, down that stream to the Missouri and Mississippi, up the Ohio to the New York canal, the Hudson river and New York.

Their trip will cover approximately 4000 miles.

"We've had a marvelous time so far," said the leader, Mrs. E. G. Clegg, of Vancouver, B. C. "I've done quite a bit of traveling but I've never done anything quite like this."

With her were Haldane (Buzz) Holmstrom, Earl C. Hamilton and Clarence Bean, all of Coquille, and Willis Johnson, of Thistle, Utah.

Holmstrom and Johnson are experienced river navigators and have a trip down the Colorado river to Boulder dam to their credit.

Mrs. Clegg said the expedition was a "private venture." "I decided to do it just for the interest," she added.

So far the trip has covered approximately 600 miles from Coquille here.

The expedition narrowly escaped tragedy near Johnson's bar, south of Lewiston. Holmstrom, riding one of the flat-bottomed river boats alone, was tossed into the raging water when he tried to navigate a rapids. Hamilton rescued him in the second boat used by the expedition.

"I'm afraid our travels will be at a slow pace the next few days," said Mrs. Clegg. "The river is quite shallow for some distance above Weiser." She declined to predict when the group would reach Yellowstone park or how long the entire journey would take.

"We just travel from day to day," she said, adding 30 miles was the greatest distance traveled in any one day so far and 1 1/2 miles was the least.

It took ten days to advance 35 miles between Johnson's bar and Homestead, Ore. In that distance they conquered the 21-mile Hell's canyon and the four-mile Box canyon of the Snake river through the Seven Devil's mountains.

"The Snake River canyon is four times as tough as the trip down the Colorado to Boulder dam, said Holmstrom, adding: "We were mighty lucky."

Dust Will Stop The Caterpillars

Damage to fruit trees and ornamental shrubs from caterpillars which are common throughout the county this year can be largely prevented by the use of a dust or a spray, according to George Jenkins, county agent. Control measures recommended for these pests are dusting the trees or shrubs with a dust prepared by mixing equal parts of calcium arsenate and hydrated lime, or using a liquid spray prepared by adding one ounce of dry powdered calcium arsenate to one gallon of water. Skim milk or soap may added as a spreader.

Grasshoppers which have been reported from several sections of the county are not thought to be doing serious damage, and while weather conditions in this section of the state are not favorable for frequent outbreaks from this pest, poison bait prepared in the county agent's office is being distributed to keep them in check.
