Applications may be made to C. C. Farr, chairman of the welfare committee of the Coquille Lions Club.

The entire course will be given absolutely free to those who signify by their application that they will make use of the opportunity.

During the eight years that the Lions Club have been giving this course to the 80,000 blind there have been 644 pupils from every state in the Union and 26 foreign countries who have availed themselves of this opportunity and all have been graduated to read the Braille.
