47 Years Ago Tragedy Recalled

(Western World)

The recent death of Ad Gross' has recalled a 47-year-old Bandon Coast Guard tragedy that occurred April 12, 1892, on the bar of the Coquille river when three men of the life-saving crew were drowned. Ad Gross was one of those saved. A clipping from the Bandon Recorder published 21 years later, was last week brought to Western World by a nephew of Captain Nelson, one of the victims.

The article "by Judge Livro" tells the story as follows:

"In taking a retrospective view of events that have taken place during the last three decades in Coos county, one of the saddest and most deplorable tragedies came to my mind, it having taken place on April 12th, 21 years ago this month, at the mouth of the Coquille river.

"In the morning of that day the life-saving crew at Bandon went out to drill between 8 and 9 o'clock, that being their regular drill day. The men provided themselves with fishing tackle, intending to cross the bar and enjoy deep sea fishing for a time. One of the crew, Ernest Braschinski, was sick, and Captain Jens Jensen was persuaded to take his place, though he hesitated, for the bar was very rough, which they found to be dangerous, as it was ebb tide. It was believed that when they saw the danger as they neared the rolling billows that they tried to turn back, when a swell caught the boat and suddenly capsized it.

"Captain Ed Neeson was in command, and the boat was righted two or three times. It is believed that Captain Nelson was injured in turning the boat, for he cried, 'Save me!' and Captain Jensen swam to him, tied a line around and fastened it to the boat and said, 'Now hang on,' just as a breaker struck them.
