Other factors that contribute to boys going wrong are suggested as toy guns, wrong type of reading, marijuana, wrong movies, radio and funnies, the automobile, gang control, unemployment, and broken homes.

U., was valued at \$116.00 and consisted of quilts, comforters, mattresses, bed linens and many other items. Thirty dollars in cash was also sent from the group.
