News From County School Supt. Office

Reorganization Board Organized

The Reorganization Board held its first regular meeting at the court house on Monday. John G. Mullen, North Bend, was elected secretary. All members were present except C. F. McCullough who is away on vacation. Other members of the board are: Judge Hugh McLain, J. P. Beyers, J. N. Gearhart, Martha E. Mulkey, Clara Jeffrey, and John G. Mullen.

There were present, school board members from Randolph, Aldercrest and Twin Oaks, interested in thinking through the problem of their own particular district. The board discussed the general purport of the law and its application to Coos county. The intent of the law is to change boundaries by revision, or elimination, after giving attention to the convenience of children attending school, the economics of transportation, the geographic barriers, etc.

Assessor J. P. Beyers appealed to those present for the necessity of an equalization of tax, stating that it was ridiculous for the taxpayers in one district to be able to collect twenty times as much on a given millage for a special school tax as its neighboring district.

The board is making an appeal to taxpayers of Coos county and especially to school directors to study their situation well and to make recommendations to the county committee. The board will be glad to meet with any group of directors from contiguous districts in which there is sentiment favoring combination of districts. Districts desiring to present matters of this kind are asked to write to John G. Mullen, secretary, North Bend, or Martha E. Mulkey, chairman.

Proposed Change in District

The District Boundary Board has set July 24, at 10 a. m. at the court house, as the time and place for a hearing on the change of boundary between Randolph and Parkersburg school district. Patrons and voters have petitioned the boundary board to set a date for the hearing in order that the land which is located on the south side of the Coquille river and which is on the opposite side of river from the school house be transferred into the Parkersburg school district. The property is valued at \$17,175.

These have been mailed out to the teachers outside of first class districts whose addresses have been left with this office.
