Red Cross To Give Swimming Lessons

Coos County Chapter, American Red Cross, is inviting the county to learn to swim—or learn to swim better.

"For years we've been talking about offering swimming and life-saving instruction; we've been perturbed over the fact that while there is water everywhere around us there is little opportunity for our boys and girls (and grownups, too) to take advantage of it as a recreational feature with safety," V. L. Adams, chapter water safety chairman, comments. "Now, we propose to open without cost a two-weeks' experimental course at Lakeside. The Red Cross provides instructor and assistants; it offers the classes under safe conditions and with proper equipment, and asks that all interested register at once."

Douglas Westerhout, graduate of special Red Cross training in swimming and life-saving, is to be instructor. Lakeside will be site for the first course, with the hope expressed by directors that the campaign may be continued later at some place in the southern end of the county.

Meanwhile, persons all over the county are invited to participate in the first free classes, which open Wednesday, July 26, at 9 a. m.

Field Meetings On Food Preservation

Different phases of garden production and food will be held in Coos county next Tuesday, July 25, as one phase of a home garden and food preservation project conducted jointly by the Coos county agricultural agent and the home demonstration agent for the purpose of stimulating interest in the production and preservation of an adequate supply of fruit and vegetables on the farm.

The first meeting on this will be held at the J. J. Geaney farm on the Cunningham road, 2½ miles from Coquille, at 10:00 A. M. and the second meeting at the A. L. Grinnell home on the highway 1½ miles south of Empire at 1:30 P.

O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist, who is cooperating with the local extension office on this project, will demonstrate simple equipment suitable for dusting and spraying for insect pest and disease control.
