Elkton Rattlesnake Den Wiped Out

Clyde Beckley, rancher of the Elkton community, has for years found his place alive with rattlesnakes. Each year an effort has been made to eradicate the snakes, and Mr. Beckley feels that he has at least succeeded.

Early this spring he found what he at first thought was a snake hide in the snow, but on closer examination found a live rattler in a coma. For several weeks after this he carried a gun and was able to kill 238 reptiles. Later he found a spot on a bluff near the Umpqua river where the rattlers hibernated during the cold weather, and with the help of neighbors packed every crevice in the bluff with powder and dynamite, setting off the charge with electricity.

When the charge was set off the bluff was gone and so were several hundred rattlers. Pieces of snake were found scattered over a distance of 50 yards. He is unable to estimate the number of snakes that might have been killed by the blast, but estimates it ran up in the hundreds.

Mr. Beckley says he has not been able since that time to find a single rattler on his 2500-acre ranch.—Port Umpqua Courier.

Teters Guilty Of Stream Pollution

P. F. Teters was found guilty in Justice Barton's court Monday afternoon, by a jury, of polluting a small tributary of the North Fork at Fairview by dumping the refuse from his slaughter house into the creek.

The jury after being out three hours—court was held in the city hall—found him guilty and recommended leniency. Justice Barton imposed a fine of \$50 and then suspended it on condition that he pay the \$28 costs.
