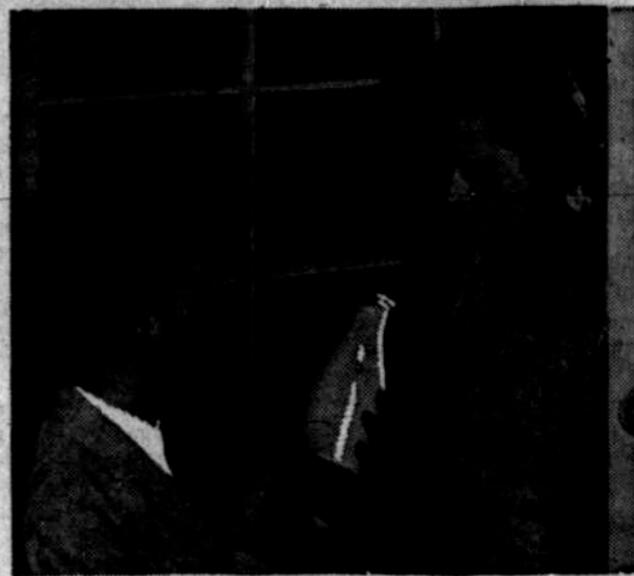
Mr. Rycraft has gone on a F. F. A. field tour to eastern Oregon.
