### Tells of Coal Mineral Survey

Clarence H. Coe, president of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, attended the directors' meeting of the Coquille chamber Tuesday noon and gave an interesting talk about what the Marshfield chamber is having done this year in surveying the coal and mineral fields of Coos county. He said that before this year ends they hoped to have a very definite report to make.

Two representatives of the state bureau of mines and geology made the first survey and their findings were so astonishing that they asked a federal geologist to check their findings and his survey confirms their report.

Coal, of which the surface indications are that there are seven billion tons within the confines of the county, is declared by these geologists not to be the "dirty" fuel which it has been called. Ten laboratories have given quite glowing reports as to its by-product content and just now two German laboratories are experimenting with samples to learn whether it is valuable in dye-making.

All have given it a high commercial value rating.

Mr. Coe did not say a great deal about the county's mineral deposits as reported by the geologists, but their findings have supported the well-known fact that minerals of many kinds exist in the Coos hills which, when developed commercially, will add a great deal to the county's wealth, especially if plants for utilizing those minerals in finished products are located here. He mentioned ten years as the time it might require to fully develop a new industry.
