**4-H Clubbers Report On Trip**

it all. The boys slept on cots in the Youth's Camp, and the Oregon delegation had accommodations next the boys from Georgia.

Gerald told how they would get the southern lads to talking, just to hear their southern dialect and he drew a laugh from his audience when he said, "Their talk gets you down."

Junior Gulstrom told of the trip from Cleveland to New York City, of their visit to Niagara Falls, into Canada, and the sights of New York, including the slums, the Park avenue wealthy homes district, the fair, Coney Island, the aquarium, and many of the big city attractions which are always so interesting to men, women, girls, as well as boys.

Fred Watson reported that they spent 14 hours of one day at the fair there, but that they saw more of the Golden Gate fair in nine hours than they did of the New York exhibition in 14. The boys enjoyed the subways of the metropolis and crowded as much sight seeing into the limited time they had there as possible.

They spent a day and two nights in Washington, D. C., but Fred confessed that he passed up a visit to the Smithsonian Institute in order to attend a New York-Washington ball game.

The return trip was hurriedly sketched but they found the two hours' ride across Salt Lake in Utah of considerable interest.

The boys returned Aug. 14 after nearly three weeks of national sight-seeing which they will never forget. The Oregon team competed with those from 31 other states and in the judging scored 2280 points out of a possible 3000. Each team had to judge 36 birds. They were ranked as a team and Oregon ranked either eleventh or twelfth in the 31 team list.

Two of the boys received the rating of excellent and one that of good. Only three teams won the rank of excellent by all of its members.

Fred Watson, who has already competed in as many contests as is permitted, will not be with the Coquille team when it contests at the International Livestock Exposition in Portland this fall, but the club has other members who will help keep its record high as did Junior Gulstrom who did his first contest judging at Corvallis and then at Cleveland.
