Employe Pays Nothing To State Unemployment Fund

Existence of confusion in the minds of Oregonians regarding the different sections of the Social Security act, especially unemployment compensation and old-age insurance, was recognized by officials of the state commission following a review of recent correspondence received in the cen-

tral office at Salem.

Although social security account numbers are used for identification and record keeping in both systems, they are entirely separate and distinct, it was pointed out.

"Many claimants for unemployment compensation believe their right to job insurance is based on deductions from their wages for that purpose," said Administrator Silas Gaiser. "This is a mistaken assumption, since the worker pays nothing for unemployment compensation in Oregon, and any deductions from his wages are for the old-age insurance program."

Only the employer contributes to the Oregon unemployment compensation fund. Not only is no contribution required from the worker, but any deductions from his wages for this purpose, whether made directly or indirectly, is expressly prohibited under the law.

The unemployment compensation program is administered by the state. The federal government assumes every cent of administrative costs. The old-age benefits program, on the other hand, taxes both worker and employer, and is administered by the federal government.

Howard Hancock has started fishing in the Coquille river, and has hired Charles Fellows to drive the milk truck for him.

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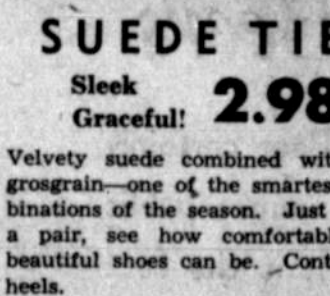
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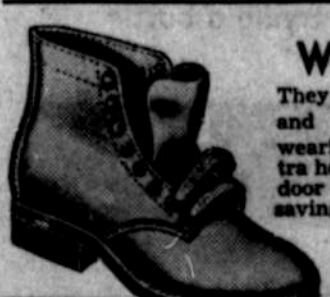
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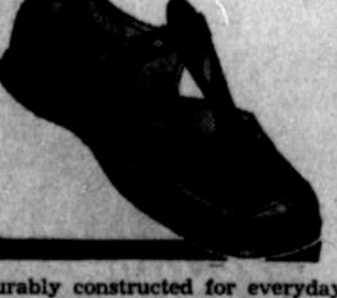
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
