Coquille High's Red Devils took the Marshfield Pirates to another cleaning last Saturday, the score being 43 to 0, an increase of five in the Coquille score over the 38-0 result when the teams met here.

Coquille's backfield flashed as brilliantly with passes and line plays as it has been doing all year. The line was just as upstanding, clearing the way for repeated gains and again opened a clear path for Everett Smith to make a 44-yard run for one touchdown.

The statistics of the game show Coquille to have made 16 first downs, Marshfield 4, and Coquille made 383 yards from scrimmage to the Pirates' 65. Yards from passes, C. 54, M. 7; penalties, C. 40 yds., M. 20. Coquille completed three out of eight pass attempts, Marshfield one in eleven. Coquille intercepted two passes, recovered four of their six fumbles; Marshfield recovered one of their two. The average punts were: C. 20 yds., M. 39; average kick-up, C. 44, M. 40. Punt return, C. 85 yards, M. 0. Kick-off return, C. 12, M. 132. Total yardage gained was 518 for Coquille, 169 for Marshfield.
