Hope To Take H. S. Band To Game

For the past week, since the Thanksgiving Day football game between the Medford Peapickers and Coquille's Red Devils was assured, there has been considerable discussion of the possibility of taking the C. H. S. band of 50 members to the game.

These young people, under the direction of Miss Anita Pageler, make a splendid impression whenever they appear and the idea of recognizing their efforts and showing appreciation in this way is one that is growing daily.

The Chamber of Commerce yesterday gave impetus to the plan by voting to contribute \$50 toward the expense which is figured at \$160 to \$175 for transportation and two meals.

A bus can be chartered for \$125 and it is probable that private conveyances can carry all over the 37 that the bus will accommodate.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce has been asked to take charge of a ticket selling campaign and as the funds received from sale of tickets here will all go to the local high school fund, it is possible that there will be a large enough sale to use part of those receipts for taking the band. Then, too, clubs and individuals will welcome this opportunity to contribute and help show appreciation of the band.

Tickets for the game are to be 50 cents for general admission, 75c for reserved seats.

Marshfield, North Bend, Myrtle Point and Bandon are also expected to be represented by fans from those towns, and the Red Devils will have hundreds of cheering supporters when they trot on the field at Medford in their most important game of the year.

Yesterday the Rotary club voted \$25 to help take the band to Medford, and the ticket sale by the Junior Chamber will undoubtedly produce a greater fund than is needed by the high school athletic fund. Two hundred and fifty reserved seats and 200 general admission tickets are to be sent over here for sale. They will also be available at Rackieff's Pharmacy.

P. U. D. Hearing All One Way

Nearly 100 At Meeting Last Friday Night--Ask Investigation of Power Project

The circuit court room was practically full last Friday night when the Oregon Hydroelectric commission held its final hearing on the desirability of forming a Public Utilities District in Coos county for the purpose of utilizing electricity from Bonneville.

The meeting can be said to have been unanimously in favor of at least investigating the possibilities of transporting Bonneville power to southwestern Oregon for if there were any present who opposed the move he or she did not make the fact known.

Present to conduct the hearing for the Hydro-electric commission were: George Joseph, Jr., Portland, chairman; John Hodgkin, vice chairman, La Grande; Charles E. Stricklin, secretary and state engineer; L. E. Stanley, commission engineer, and Ray Potter, official reporter.

Engineer Stanley made the first talk, confining himself to a statement of facts and statistics. The area it is proposed to include in the P. U. D. is 1070 square miles, or two-thirds of the county's area. The estimated population to be served is 30,450 people.

The nearest thing to a voiced objection to a P. U. D. in Coos county were the petitions from the north end of the county which asked that the Lakeside and Templeton sections be left out of the district, that of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company that its holdings be not included, and the petition signed by 150 asking that Coos river be set as the north boundary of the district.

Harry H. Schultz, of North Bend, who has been one of the active leaders in the attempt to bring Bonneville power to Coos county gave as his opinion that cheap power from Bonneville would build up an industrial empire in this section. The development of an industry to bring the minerals of southwestern Oregon to a place of prominence in the nation was another incentive for cheap power, he said.

While some of the various representatives called on were out and out advocates of bringing Bonneville power to Coos county, others declared they hoped the plan would be thoroughly investigated and if it could be shown a saving of power expense would follow if juice was transmitted to Coos county from Bonneville.

J. P. Beyers, representative of the Coquille Chamber of Commerce, was one of the latter, but his statement that he believed in public ownership of utilities is one with which many members of the organization he represented cannot agree.

Others who spoke briefly when called upon by Mr. Schultz were Dr. T. E. Montgomery, Marshfield; M. C. Miller, Dora; Ray E. Deadmond, Fairview; W. H. Hillar, Empire; Hans Selfors, North Bayside; Joe Berghammer, North Bend; Lawrence Jennings, Remote; Mrs. Rex Brown, McKinley; C. L. Church, Myrtle Point, and Joseph A. Larson, Marshfield.

With this hearing completed the hydro-electric commission will continue to investigate and consider all phases of the matter, and it should come as no surprise if an election is called, to be held at the same time as the primary next spring to vote upon the question of forming a P. U. D. from two-thirds of Coos county.

C. H. S. To Play Bandon Saturday

All this talk about cancelling the Tiger-Red Devils game at Bandon next Saturday is folderol and without any foundation. In order to win the county championship, Coquille must play at least once each team in the conference.
