

The circuit court room was practically full last Friday night when the Oregon Hydroelectric commission held its final hearing on the desirability of forming a Public Utilities District in Coos county for the purpose of utilizing electricity from Bonneville.

The meeting can be said to have been unanimously in favor of at least investigating the possibilities of transporting Bonneville power to southwestern Oregon for if there were any present who opposed the move he or she did not make the fact known.

Present to conduct the hearing for the Hydro-electric commission were: George Joseph, Jr., Portland, chairman; John Hodgin, vice chairman, retary and state engineer; L. E. Stanley, commission engineer, and Ray Potter, official reporter.
