Snell Warns Of December Dangers

Warning Oregonians that the month of December, 1938, had been the worst month of the year for pedes-trian accidents, Earl Snell, secretary of state, urges motorists and pedes-trians to exercise great care during the present month in the hope of pre-venting a repetition of last Decemrecord

Of the 28 persons killed during that month, 14 or 50 per cent were pedes-rians. With the exception of Novem-ber, no other month had that many pedestrian fatalities last year. All told there were 196 pedestrian acci-dents, 65 more than during January, the next worst month for pedestrian accidents.

"During the holiday shopping period, streets of our cities are crowded with shoppers, many of them loaded down with packages so that their vis-ibility is seriously impaired," Snell pointed out. "Added to this is the fact that the streets are crowded with more vehicles than normal. Under such conditions it is plain that unless precautions are taken by both motor-ists and pedestrians, there will be more accidents than normally might more accidents be expected."

The secretary of state urges persons on foot not to load themselves down with bundles, interfering with their ability to watch for traffic as they ross, the crowded streets and he warned motorists they must be more than ever on the lookout for pedestrians

Fifty-seven per cent of the pedes-trians killed last December were committing an obviously unsafe act at the time they were struck, Snell's figures thow. Four persons were killed while reasing the street between intersections and others were struck while sing intersections diagonally valking into the side of passing cars, walking with traffic on highways and stepping into streets from between parked cars.


