Snell Warns Of December Dangers

Warning Oregonians that the month of December, 1938, had been the worst month of the year for pedestrian accidents, Earl Snell, secretary of state, urges motorists and pedestrians to exercise great care during the present month in the hope of preventing a repetition of last December's record.

Of the 28 persons killed during that month, 14 or 50 per cent were pedestrians. With the exception of November, no other month had that many pedestrian fatalities last year. All told there were 196 pedestrian accidents, 65 more than during January, the next worst month for pedestrian accidents.

"During the holiday shopping period, streets of our cities are crowded with shoppers, many of them loaded down with packages so that their visibility is seriously impaired," Snell pointed out. "Added to this is the fact that the streets are crowded with more vehicles than normal. Under such conditions it is plain that unless precautions are taken by both motorists and pedestrians, there will be more accidents than normally might be expected."

The secretary of state urges persons on foot not to load themselves down with bundles, interfering with their ability to watch for traffic as they cross the crowded streets and he warned motorists they must be more than ever on the lookout for pedestrians.

Fifty-seven per cent of the pedestrians killed last December were committing an obviously unsafe act at the time they were struck, Snell's figures show. Four persons were killed while crossing the street between intersections and others were struck while crossing intersections diagonally, walking into the side of passing cars, walking with traffic on highways and stepping into streets from between parked cars.
