Two Women Sought U. S.

Presidential Nomination

Relva A. Lockwood, who headed the ticket of the Equal Rights party in 1884 and again in 1888, was not the first woman nominated for the presidency of the United States. That honor belongs to Mrs. Victor Claffin Woodhull, who in 1872 was nominated for the presidency at Vineland, N. J., by a convention styling itself the Equal Rights party. Frederick Douglass, the negro reformer, was the candidate for vice president. The campaigns of these two women amounted chiefly to suffrage propaganda, since neither could have held the office had they been elected, asserts a writer in the Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Mrs. Lockwood, lawyer and reformer, was born in 1830, at Royalton, N. Y. She was educated at Genesee college, Lima, N. Y., and taught school for eleven years. Then she studied law and was admitted to practice before the Supreme court, under a law which she had been instrumental in getting passed. Presidential Nomination

Born Belva Ann Bennett, she was married in 1848 to Uriah H. McNall, who died five years later, and in 1868 to Dr. Ezekiel Lockwood. She died in 1917.


