N.Y.A. Administrator Will Register For Jobs Jan. 10

Henry Lecocq, of Marshfield, Coos county administrator of the National Youth Administration, was in Coquille yesterday contacting young men and women who may wish to register for NYA projects. Anyone interested may see him any day in Marshfield and he will be in the Coquille city hall on Wednesday, Jan. 10.

The young people who register for these projects in which they are taught some trade are paid \$15 for 50 hours per month endeavor. All projects are of a public nature. One in the county is at the county highway shop here on Spurgeon Hill; another one is conducted in library work by the county school superintendent, and still another is in connection with County Agent Jenkins' work. The age limits are set at 18 and 24 years.

Mr. Lecocq also has application NYA blanks for registration for the Skinner Butte camp at Eugene where some vocation is taught those attending. The camp started last September and continues until June 30, 1940, with attendance possible at any time.

Young men and women desiring more detailed information as to what the NYA offers should contact Mr. Lecocq.
