Now Available

Farm Security Administration aid for Coos and Curry county farm families whose operations are in jeopardy, is available through county FSA offices in the Laird Building. Coquille, reports Norman Fletcher, local supervisor. Operators on family-sized farms whose livelihood is threatened by lack of adequate credit facilities or similar causes are eligible for FSA assistance.

Sufficient funds have been allotted to this district to provide for estimated needs of all handicapped farm families through FSA operating goods, livestock, and co-operative loans, as well as debt adjustment and supervisory services. Co-operative farm and home plans stressing business-life management and production of home food needs is the basis of each rehabilitation loan.

Farmers expecting to request aid for next year's operations are asked to file applications as soon as posible so facilities can be made available for the coming crop season.

Complete information as to the farm security program may be ob tained at the Coquille office.
