Project Leaders To Meet Monday

Project leaders representing their extension units in various parts of the county will meet on Monday, January 8, in the Circuit court rooms of the Court House in Coquille to receive training in the project, "Quality Guides in Buying Ready-to-Wear," which will be given by Miss Lucy Lane, specialist in Clothing and Textiles from Oregon State College.

This consumer education demonstration was chosen by the women at program planning day as being of particular value in the modern age when a great percentage of so many women's wardrobes are purchased ready made. Some authorities have stated that by studying buying points and knowing how to read labels and check up on the workmanship on ready-made garments as much as 50 per cent of the clothing budget can be saved. The project leader meeting is open only to delegated leaders from each group, who will give the demonstration in their respective communities later. The public is invited to attend the extension unit meetings.

ally and socially was illustrated by checking up on a questionnaire which may be obtained from the home demonstration agent's office in the court house at Coquille.

Burton W. Dunn, superintendent of the Coquille schools, called the roll of attendance of parents from grades in the Washington school which were competing to see which had the most parents at the meeting. Valley View school led with 23 parents when Mrs. Martha Mulkey checked the number of parents from the six rural schools near Coquille, which were competing in a like contest on a basis of percentages.

A family relations skit, "The Family Plans" was presented by five Myrtle Point high school students, directed by Miss Margaret Stevenson. The shift from the autocratic to democratic family was well depicted in the three scenes of the skit.

A question-box containing "What would you do if your fifteen-year old daughter talked saucy to you and then said she loved you and was sorry; what effect will it have on children if father and mother have different religions, and is it too late to change our methods of raising children by the time they are adolescents." In leading the discussion during the question-box, Mrs. Maris explained that Parent Education's purpose was not to answer questions but to suggest possible approaches, guides and a key to normal behavior of children at various age levels so that parents will be more able to meet problems wisely.

On March 4, 5, and 6 Mrs. Maris will again be in Coos county for a series of Family Relations discussions, one of which will be an address to the Coquille high school students.

Program For Home Extension School

The Home Extension School for the coming week includes a project leader meeting on Quality Guides in Buying Ready Made Garments on Monday, January 8, an extension unit meeting at Coos River on Tuesday, January 9, a special demonstration on decorative stitches at the North Bayside Grange Hall on Monday, January 10, and a remodeling school on Thursday and Friday of the same week in the Green Dell Grange Hall.

On Monday, January 15, Mrs. Lela McCue, Mrs. Sally Ward and Miss Julia Bennett, home demonstration agent, will participate in the radio club series on "What Behavior Reveals." Extension unit meetings will feature a demonstration on minor alterations and repairs on ready-made garments, which will be given during January. Quality guides in buying ready-made garments is the demonstration which will be presented by project leaders during January. Extension units meet each month with project leaders, who give the demonstration one month and the home demonstration agent the next.

Tuesday, January 16, is the meeting day for the Powers-Gaylord unit. On Wednesday, January 17, the Dora-Sitkum extension unit will meet with Mrs. Roy Swan.

Any persons interested in attending any of the extension meetings, which are free, are invited to inquire for more particulars from any county committee member, the home demonstration agent or the one chairman nearest them. F. S. A. Funds Now Available

Farm Security Administration aid for Coos and Curry county farm families whose operations are in jeopardy, is available through county FSA offices in the Laird Building, Coquille, reports Norman Fletcher, local supervisor. Operators on family-sized farms whose livelihood is threatened by lack of adequate credit facilities or similar causes are eligible for FSA assistance.

Sufficient funds have been allotted to this district to provide for estimated needs of all handicapped farm families through FSA operating goods, livestock, and co-operative loans, as well as debt adjustment and supervisory services. Co-operative farm and home plans stressing business-life management and production of home food needs is the basis of each rehabilitation loan.

Farmers expecting to request aid for next year's operations are asked to file applications as soon as possible so facilities can be made available for the coming crop season.

Complete information as to the farm security program may be obtained at the Coquille office.
