

Lincoln School News

During the past week the Lincoln school basketball teams have met the teams of Bridge and Bunker Hill, and the girls volley ball team has played the Bridge girls.

On Wednesday, January 10, the Bridge volley ball and basketball teams met the local teams here and returned home with a tie in volley ball and a decisive win in basketball. This was the first game of the season for the volley ball teams and although the Junior High girls were well ahead during the last half of the game, the last few minutes of play brought the score to a tie of 40-40.

The boys were playing their second game and for some reason could not seem to get started. The Bridge team consisted of smaller and faster boys who outplayed the local boys in both ball handling and basket shooting with the result that the game ended 21-12 in favor of the visitors. A portion of this superiority may be charged to the longer practice season as no football is played at Bridge and basketball practice begins much earlier than it does here. On Saturday the boys played their first games away from the home floor. Both teams competed with teams at Bunker Hill and in each case Coquille won. The "midget" game ended with a score of 8-2, although a great portion of it was played with the score standing at a tie of 2-2. The regular squad made a comfortable lead early in the second quarter and held that lead until the last few minutes of play when the Bunker Hill boys began to sink some of their shots. The game ended 11-8 in favor of Coquille.

The winning of these games greatly encouraged the local boys who were beginning to be somewhat discouraged after the loss of their first

two games. With this encouragement and with added practice they expect to make a much better showing in future games.
