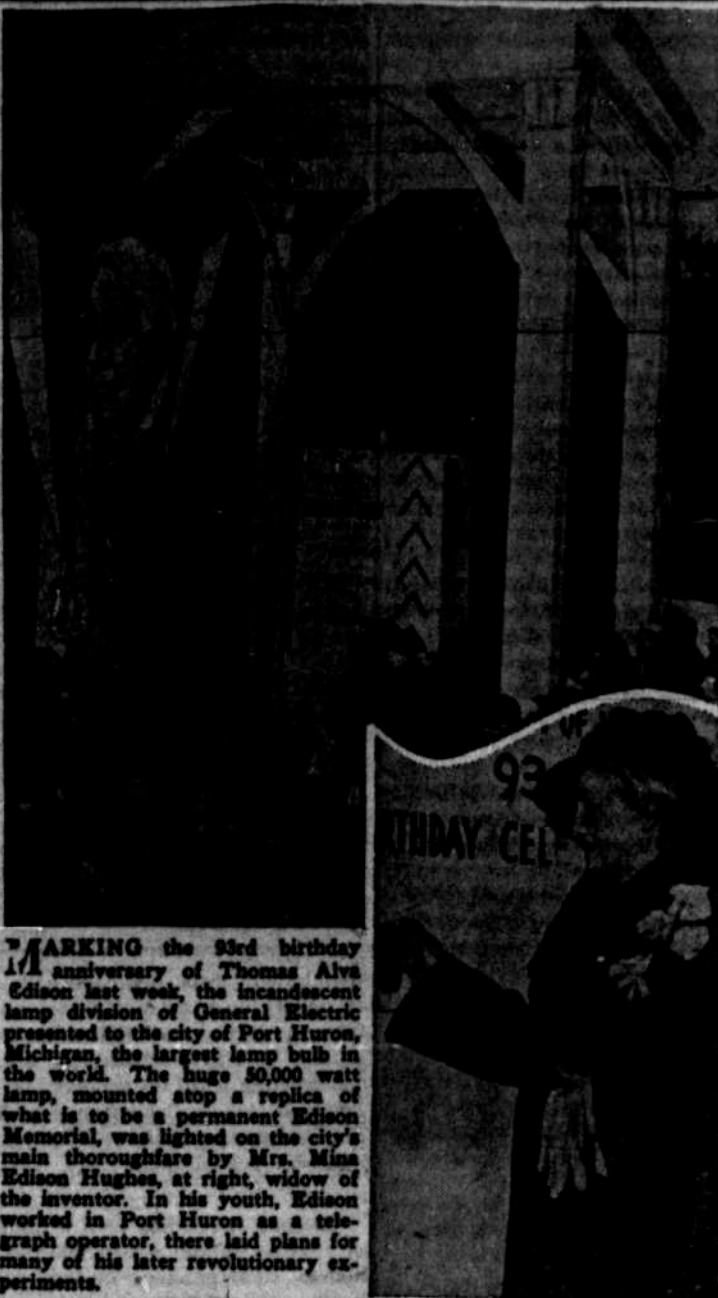

E. L. Peterson Announces For County Judge

Ervin L. Peterson, prominent dairy farmer who lives at Haynes Inlet, today announced his candidacy for the republican nomination for Coos county judge at the May primaries. Peterson said he would file his formal announcement of candidacy within a few days.

Mr. Peterson who was born at North Bend has spent the bulk of his life in Coos county, having in recent years been engaged in the dairy business at the home farm. Since 1938 he has served as president of the Coos County Dairymen's association. He served two years as Pomona grange master for Coos county and was re-elected to that post last year, his present term expiring in 1941.

This year, with his brother, Peterson became active and financially interested in the fish business, their firm now operating as Peterson Bros. Sea Products, Inc., at North Bend. He is a director as well of the Coos Bay Mutual Creamery.

"Should I receive nomination and election as county judge my goal would be to draw all producing interests of the county together for the development of this area," Peterson said today. "I want industry, agriculture and labor all to work together so this county can go forward. I am also extremely interested in the development of new industry and income for Coos county."

Peterson said his program would call for steady elimination of the debt of Coos county and the reduction of taxes through economical administration of Coos county affairs.
