Walsh Files for State Senator

Wm. Walsh, of Marshfield, today filed with the secretary of state his petition to have his name placed on the ballot at the May primary as a candidate for the republican nomination for state senator from Coos and Curry counties.

Mr. Walsh is an Oregon resident, one whose interests are in southwestern Oregon, and is a man who can ably represent this section in the state senate. He has had experience in public office, having served Coos county as district attorney, and will ably represent his district and the state in the upper chamber of the legislature.

Following is the statement of principles on which he will base his campaign in seeking election to the office of state senator:

- (1) Encourage in every sound manner agriculture and the growth and manufacture of timber products, realizing these are and will long remain the basic industries of Oregon.
- (2) Add to and develop new sources of state revenue — mining, fishing, tourists, recreation, thereby broadening the economic base of the commonwealth.
- (3) Demand rigid economy in the operation of government—taxes must not drive out industry and confiscate property.
- (4) Support the right of labor to organize and bargain collectively for its protection and advancement; further legislation to insure payment of wages when earned.
- (5) Promote legislation for relief of the aged, the unemployed, and the physically unfit, consistent with the State's resources.
- (6) Enact less but better legislation and see that it is enforced.
- (7) Give an honest and careful examination to all questions in the public interest, with special privileges to none.

Chas. Doane's Platform As A Candidate

Ex-County Commissioner Charles Doane, of Marshfield, and who has been a resident of Coos county for forty-two years, makes formal announcement today that he will be a candidate for county judge on the republican ticket at the May primaries.

In his statement Mr. Doane declares, "If I am nominated and elected, my policy will be, 'To Practice Business Efficiency with Progressive Economy fair to all.'"

"If elected county judge, I shall consistently plan and work during my administration, to make the county court a helpful co-operative department of public service to all the people of this county in their every activity—Dairying, Agriculture, Industry, Business, Education, etc.

"I have a whole-hearted and sincere desire to see the whole of Coos county make good, sound, progressive development. With that goal in mind I shall do my utmost, if elected county judge, to be helpful in having new industries locate in our county, and to encourage the further development and expansion of the going concerns, already in our midst, to the end that payrolls may be larger, buying power of workers increased, thus creating a greater volume of business in every community so that all our people may be happy, prosperous and contented.

"I am not under any obligation by or through pledge or promise, or in any other way, to any particular individual or group. All promises I have made are contained in this, my public statement, which is my platform, and these promises and pledges are made to every citizen in Coos county. And all other promises I may make during my campaign will be made openly to all. And I am not associated with, or engaged in any business or profession to which I am bound to give a part of my time and attention. If elected county judge, I will be absolutely free to devote all my time, attention and effort to county business. I promise to do this to the best of my ability.

"I was a member of the county court for a term of four years, as county commissioner of Coos county. During those four years of practical training and experience I acquired a good working knowledge of how to conduct and to handle the business of the county court. This does make me much better qualified to do the work of county judge than I would be if I had not had that practical training and experience.

"If I am elected county judge, I shall do all that is humanly possible for a county judge to do, to get Coos county out of debt as soon as possible. And I shall do my whole duty as county judge, to all, to every man and woman and child, and to every community in Coos county.

"If elected county judge, I will make my home in Coquille during my term in office."

The three are Judge J. T. Brand, of Coos county; Judge Geo. F. Skipworth, of Lane, and Judge Carl E. Wimberly, of Douglas county.

R. E. A. Electrical Institute March 26-27

Those who are interested in rural electrification will have an opportunity to see motion pictures on irrigation in the Willamette valley, to see various types of electrical fixtures and equipment, and to hear discussions on safe and adequate wiring, better home lighting, and the use of electricity for irrigation and other farm power purposes at a two-day institute which will be held in the Oddfellow's Hall in Coquille on Tuesday and Wednesday, March 26 and 27.

The program will start in this hall at 10:00 a. m. on Tuesday, March 26, with a general discussion on irrigation led by Arthur King, extension specialist in soils. A moving picture dealing with irrigation in the Willamette valley will be shown.

On Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 the group will gather at the W. E. Cross farm near Coquille on the Fishtrap road, to see various types of irrigation equipment in operation. Representatives of several companies have signified their intention of being present with a display.

The program on Wednesday, March 27, will open again in the Odd Fellows Hall at 10:00 a. m. with a general discussion of the status of the Coos Electric Cooperative, Inc., and all members of this organization are especially urged to be present for this session which will be led by Ivan Laird, president. Following this, Miss Joan Patterson, extension specialist in home furnishings, will discuss better home lighting, using different types of fixtures and equipment to illustrate her talk.

The afternoon program on Wednesday will start at 1:30 with a discussion by W. R. Volhegy, chief electrical inspector for the Bureau of Labor, who will talk on safe and adequate electrical wiring mainly for the benefit of those persons who are planning to wire homes and other buildings for electricity in the near future. Following this, consideration will be given to the use of electricity to furnish power for farm refrigeration, water systems, milking machines, and other power uses, with this discussion led by Everett H. Davis, extension specialist in agricultural engineering.

It is expected that various types of electrical fixtures and equipment commonly used in homes and on the farm will be displayed in the hall

during this institute by several business firms which handle this merchandise. While this institute is being held at this time primarily for the benefit of the prospective new users of electricity, all persons interested in this subject are invited to attend, according to George Jenkins, county agent, who has arranged this program in cooperation with local people.
