

Fishing Season Opens Saturday

to angle for a period of two consecutive days will cost \$2.00.

Any blind person may secure without payment of any fee a license to angle by filing application with the office of the State Game Commission.

Fishing for bass is legal throughout the year in all parts of the state except Oswego lake in Clackamas county, where the bass season extends from April 13th to October 31st, both dates inclusive.

All fishermen should remember that it is always unlawful: To angle at any time between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise; to fish by any means other than with hook and line; to use more than one line or line and rod held in the hand; to use more than two blades on a spinner for lake or stream fishing; to use more than three hooks on a line except on floating bass plugs; to sell, or offer for sale or exchange any fish taken with hook and line; to transport or ship game fish without written permit; to fish without a license on person; to refuse to show license upon demand; to angle within 200 feet of any fishway; to waste wantonly game fish or allow others to do so; to angle on private lands without permission from the owners; to net, trap, spear, gaff, club or shoot fish; to resist or interfere with the duties of any officer enforcing the game laws; and to fail to make a report to the State Game Commission of all game fish taken during 1939 at the time of making application for the 1940 license.

Fishermen Asked To Co-operate

Co-operation of fishermen of Oregon in reporting catches of fish from various streams and lakes, to assist in the scientific liberation of fish, is sought by the Oregon State Game Commission.

At a recent meeting of the game commission, a new department, known as the scientific liberation department, was set up. In addition to liberations this department will conduct surveys of lakes and streams.

The work of this department cannot be completed unless reports are obtained of the catches in the various streams and lakes. To make it easy for the sportmen to assist, a "catch card" has been prepared and will be distributed to all sportmen's organizations, fishing tackle dealers and all resorts that cater to sportmen.

The cards are post paid so no expense is involved to the fishermen, who after his day's outing can fill out the card and drop it into a mail box or postoffice.

Officials of the game commission are hopeful that a large percentage of the fishermen will give their co-operation and make constant use of the "catch cards" so that catches of various species of fish from the various waters of Oregon may be recorded.

No Bounty On Cougar Kittens

Bounties on young cougar kittens with eyes not naturally opened, and whose mothers have been killed, need not be paid by the Oregon State Game Commission, according to an opinion given by I. H. Van Winkle, attorney general.

"The purpose of the law," the opinion reads in part, "is to accomplish the eradication of cougars. The killing of cougar kittens too young to survive after the eradication of their mother would in no way be a protection to game or fur-bearing animals, and for that reason the payment of the bounty provided for the killing of each such kitten would be inconsistent with the purpose and intent of the act."

Attention is called in the opinion to the fact that it is a penal offense for any person to keep any cougar in captivity for breeding purposes and therefore the game commission is not required to pay bounties upon any cougar or cougar kitten that has been fostered in captivity.

While funds for the payment of bounties on wild cats has been exhausted for the present calendar year, there are still ample funds for the payment of cougar bounties.
