P. U. D. Lowers No Rates In Washington

As to taxes paid by the Puds, he says that schools, cities, port districts nor counties receive one cent of tax money from the Puds but that the state does receive three or four per cent.

In this connection it should be remembered that Attorney General Van Winkle has ruled in Oregon that Puds pay no tax. If that opinion is upheld in the courts what will it do to the average taxpayer's pocketbook in Coos county where the Mt. States Power Co. has paid one-tenth of the local county tax?
