

City Council Met Monday

The council session Monday evening with Mayor Milne and all councilmen except O. L. Wood present, was a longer session than usual but there were no exciting high lights unless the last matter brought to the council's attention could be so considered. The frequently recurring dog question was the subject of a lady's complaint and she had a most just cause for asking enforcement of the dog ordinance. She said she was very tired of cleaning up after a neighbor's dog, which slipped into her house whenever the door was open, and defiled the floor. She also wanted to know if chickens must not be kept penned in the spring. When told what the dog ordinance enforce-

ment required she said she certainly would file a complaint. A letter was read from K. E. Koon of the engineering firm which supervised the building of the Rink creek dam. Mr. Koon made many suggestions as to treatment of the water supply and care of the dam and stated his investigation a short time ago convinced him that there was no flaw in the recent addition to the dam which might endanger it. An ordinance was adopted approving the specifications prepared by Engineer Gearhart for a road to the reservoir and ordering that the work be done. Water Superintendent Epperson reported that he was laying water mains on Fairview street, in the southeast section of the city and that a pipe line had been requested to supply water to the houses which

will be built just outside the city limits. This is on the W. J. Furbrache tract where he has recently sold four or five lots. A request was made for the probable cost for a lot for a sewer system lying between the gulch and Tenth street and for several blocks east of Henry street. A petition is being circulated asking for the sewer improvement there, but many wished to know what it would cost before signing the petition. Engineer Gearhart estimated the job, as a WPA project, as between \$35 and \$45 per lot. Another improvement—grading and graveling—was asked by Mrs. Duffy for the block on Heath street, between Fifth and Sixth. The matter was referred to the street committee and the engineer for a report. Wayne Robinson asked that the city use scraper and roller on the portion of Myrtle Park where the Youth Council is planning on creating a more extensive playground layout than has ever been attempted in Coquille before. The park commission was instructed to co-operate with the Youth Council as far as possible.
