

Pioneer of 1876 Buried Monday

Lucinda Ann Morgan, daughter of the late Sol. J. and Mary A. McCloskey, was born in Rochester, Minn., Feb. 28, 1864, and passed away at Bandon, Ore., May 30, 1940.

While a small child she moved with her parents to Cherokee, Kansas, and at the age of 12, started in an emigrant train for the west. After a five months' trip, they arrived in Coos county in 1876; and settled where Gravel Ford is now.

Six years later the family moved to Norway, where she made her home until she was married. As soon as she was old enough she began teaching and for many years she was one of the county's most successful teachers, and one of the first teachers in the Bandon school.

On Feb. 26, 1893, she was united in marriage to Evan Morgan and Bandon has been her home the greater part of the time since.

To this union two children were born, a daughter, Edna Lura Morgan, of Bandon, and a son, Evan Morgan, of New York.

Her husband passed away in 1906. Surviving her, besides her son and daughter, are two sisters, Mrs. Agnes Smith, of St. Joseph, Mo., and Mrs. Minnie Lester, of Corcoran, Calif., and one brother, James H. McCloskey, of Norway, and many nieces and nephews.

During the Bandon fire of 1936 her home was destroyed and she moved to Coquille but later returned to make her home near Bandon.

She was an active member of the Methodist church and taught in the Sunday school for many years.

Funeral services were held Monday, June 3, in the Presbyterian church in Bandon, Rev. Elmer Rosenkild conducting the services. Interment was at Norway, her former home.

Veteran Passes At Age of 93

The last surviving veteran of the Civil war, in Coos county, and there are very few in the whole United States, passed away at his home south of Bandon last Saturday. He was Alfred Flanders, 93 years of age, who had resided in Coos county for 68 years.

Full military honors were accorded him at the funeral services held Tuesday afternoon in the Legion hall.

Mr. Flanders was born in Kent county, Mich., and took his place in the army when he was 18 years of age. His first vote was for Abraham Lincoln when the martyred president ran for office the second time.

Mrs. Flanders to whom he was married in 1878 at Myrtle Point, passed away last year. He is survived by ten children, Mrs. Maude Brown, Harry, Ray, Elmer, Chas., Grant and George Flanders, all of Bandon, Mrs. Grace Cox, of North Bend, Mrs. Edna Robinson of Grants Pass and Mrs. Ellen Harper of Spokane.

F. F. Eddy, publisher of the Port Orford Post, who suffered a paralytic stroke several months ago, passed away there last Thursday afternoon at the age of 71 years.

The body was taken to Salem last Friday for cremation and a memorial service was held at the Sixes Grange hall on Sunday.

Mr. Eddy, who was born in Charlotteville, Mich., had been a resident of Oregon for 32 years. His widow has been conducting the Post's business for the past several months. The Post has no plant, the work of printing and getting out the paper being done in the Western World shop at Bandon.

Navy Seeking Enlistments

In connection with the Navy's expansion program, which calls for an increase of enlisted personnel to 170,000 men, the quota of sixty recruits assigned the Portland Recruiting District for the month of June, has been increased to 100, it was announced by Lieutenant Commander L. B. Stuart, local navy recruiting officer. This large quota has been exceeded only once during the period since the president declared a "Limited Emergency" last September. Local waiting lists have been entirely depleted and men now applying for enlistment are usually accepted within thirty days from the date of application.

Enlistments Now Open In Marines

The United States Marine Corps recruiting office in the U. S. court house at Portland has been authorized to accept an unlimited number of men for enlistment during the month of June, according to word received today from Captain James B. Hardie, officer in charge of Marine Corps recruiting activities in the Portland district.

This, Captain Hardie stated, is due to the fact that congress has authorized the expansion of the Marine

Corps to 34,000 enlisted men, its greatest peace time strength. Due to this great increase, promotion will be faster than it has been at any time during the past twenty years, the captain said.

Male United States citizens between the age of 18 and 30, without dependents, of good habits and character, and in good health, are eligible for enlistment.
