

### Tax Foreclosure Decree Signed

The final decree in the delinquent tax foreclosure suit was signed by Judge Brand last Saturday and filed in the county clerk's office on Monday. That is the suit in which more than 4,000 pieces of property in the county were involved in the advertisement which appeared in all the county papers last December. Since then more than 600 tracts and lots have been redeemed. The file to the remaining property now

rests in the county but it cannot be sold for a year yet. Entering the 550 pages of typewritten copy twice in the county clerk's records is quite a job for the force there.

street between Seventh and Eighth, the property owners to contribute the money for purchase of the rock, which the city's crew would spread after the grading was done. The council ordered that the repair and painting of fire hydrants, as recommended by the fire department in a special report, be done at once.

To succeed L. W. Claver and L. L. Bonney, who refused to accept appointment on the city's park commission, Mayor Milne named Stanton Stevens and O. C. Sanford. The appointments were confirmed by the council.

The matter of vacating a block of Sumner avenue in the Knowlton Heights section, at the southwest edge of the city, was dropped from consideration by the council. One reason for this action is that the hearing was not held as advertised and the legality of a vacation could be attacked by those who may be opposed. If it is to come up again there must be a new petition presented and notice of a hearing again advertised.

In connection with this matter, Engineer Gearhart stated that the line of the city limits there is very indefinite, the dedication to the city not being clearly worded. He and the city attorney were authorized to examine the records and if necessary submit an ordinance which will definitely locate the southeast boundary line of Coquille.

Councilman Pettit was appointed a committee to make such arrangements as may be necessary to insure that the fire hall is not again left in such a mess as it has been every time a load of wood is delivered to the city hall. The stove and pipe were knocked over the last time wood was delivered there.

Now that the Community Building is being used so infrequently for dances, Recorder Leslie, with an eye toward increasing revenues to at least enough to pay the janitor's wages, told of a proposal made by Art Graham that he (Graham) furnish the skates, the city the building, and that roller skating be permitted there three nights a week. Mr. Graham and the city to split 50-40.

The council did not approve of the city's entering the roller skating business, as it would do if the proceeds were split, and requested Frank Dungey to make an examination of the floor and underpinning before skating was permitted if Mr. Graham cared to lease the building for the purpose.
