

Sixty 4-H Club Boys And Girls Left Mon. For Summer School

Coos county will be represented at 4-H Club summer school, held annually on the Oregon State College Campus at Corvallis, by 60 club members, representing practically every kind of club and all communities of the county. This county's largest delegation to attend, left the county Monday morning by special bus and will arrive home on Friday afternoon, June 21. Accompanying the group is Miss Edwina Siestrem of Hauser, and Mrs. Walter Laird of Myrtle Point, both local leaders who are acting as chaperones, also Julia Bennett, county home demonstration agent and George H. Jenkins, county agent.

Coos county 4-H club members will be among the 500 delegates over the state selected to broadcast during the 4-H club summer school in session from June 10 to 21 on the Oregon State College campus.

Coos county will broadcast from 7 to 7:45 Thursday, June 13, "Grandma's Preserves," is the title of the prize winning play written by Pat Rawe, of Coos county. This play was selected as one of the best of the 31 manuscripts submitted in the state-wide 4-H club radio playwriting contest and will be presented over the radio on the Coos county program from 7 to 7:45, Thursday, June 13.

Talented 4-H club members chosen from the 2000 4-H club members attending summer school will participate in radio revues to be broadcast Saturday night, June 15, from 7:30 to 8 o'clock and Wednesday night, June 19, from 8 o'clock to 8:30.

Among the other interesting programs in which 4-H club members will participate is the weekly Traffic Safety program on June 12 and 19 from 12:15 to 12:30, noon, featuring the winning plays written from the Traffic Safety playwriting contest sponsored by Earl Snell, Secretary of State.

Daily broadcasts as assembly programs from 2 to 3 o'clock will be presented from June 11 to 20, except Sunday.

Sunday, June 16, the entire summer school delegation will broadcast a special outdoor Sunday service held on the campus quadrangle.

Burton Hulton, director of agricultural programs over KOAC and a former 4-H club member, is in charge of the assembly and county broadcasts. James Morris, announcer of KOAC and director of 4-H club radio plays, will select the casts for the ten radio plays and is in charge of directing.

Non High Election

Mrs. Ida Linder and Adam Donaldson, Jr., are the two candidates whose names appear on the ballots which have been mailed from the office of County School Superintendent to individual school districts of Zone 2 of Non High School District. This zone includes Eastside-Cooston, Allegany (including former west Allegany) and Sumner (including former Catching Inlet). These candidates will be balloted on by voters of Zone 2 on June 17, annual school meeting day.

Also on this day in Non High Districts all voters who are eligible to vote on election of director and clerk are asked to ballot on question of whether or not transportation should be continued by Non High District after close of school year 1940-41. This is merely an advisory vote.

The District Board of 26C will receive bids until Saturday, June 29 at 7:30 p. m. at Hauser church; the amount of \$13,000 in bonds will be sold.

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Work To Start At Once

Preparations are under way to start work at once building barges for the Port of Bandon at the Prosper shipyards, according to J. E. Walstrom, vice president and manager, who has already placed an order for a number of piling necessary in making the foundation on which to build the barges at the port shipyard.

The program calls for the building of three barges to be used in carrying lumber down the Coquille river from the Smith Wood Products company plant at Coquille to shipside here.

Each barge will be approximately 120 feet long, 40 feet wide and 9 feet deep. The three together will carry 1,000,000 feet of lumber, an average load for ships calling at Bandon.

After the yards are put into shape, a crew of 10 to 12 men can build one barge every six weeks, according to J. E. Norton, president of the port. The barges will be financed by a \$25,000 bond issue approved by voters May 17. The bonds will be sold Tuesday night, June 25, at the Coquille city hall.

The Smith Wood Products company will pay a regular towing fee, and also will spend a considerable sum for dredging a turning basin and building a loading dock.—Western World.
