To Fix Hunting Regulations

Regulations for the 1940 hunting season will be formulated next month by the Oregon State Game Commission. The annual hearing on this subject has been set in the Portland offices of the Commission, 616 Oregon Building, at 9 a. m., July 13.

Questionnaires have been forwarded to all sportsmen's organizations with the request that they be filled out and returned to the commission office as soon as possible.

Subjects to be considered include the issuance of special tags for taking cow elk in the northeastern part of the state; open and closed seasons on Chinese pheasants, quail and grouse, as well as trapping regulations on furbearing animals.
