Wallace Dement Accepts Republican Nomination

Wallace B. Dement, life-long resident of Myrtle Point, whose name was written in by many republican voters at the primary last month, has decided to accept the nomination as a candidate for the office of representative of the 16th legislative district of the state of Oregon.

Mr. Dement is unusually well qualified to act as a member of the house at the legislature session next January and February, and as he was not a candidate prior to the primary there can be no question as to the accuracy of the statements made in the following announcements he has sent out to the newspapers of the county. He will oppose J. H. McCloskey, democrat incumbent, in the November election:

"Born and raised in Coos county, I have been for sixteen years in active practice of law in Myrtle Point. I was, for fifteen years continuously, city attorney of Myrtle Point, have been clerk of our Union High School district, am president of Coos County Fair Association, and an attorney for the Security Bank, of which I am a director. My personal interests, and those of my family, are primarily in dairying and livestock raising. I was nominated wholly without my knowledge or solicitation. Not being a candidate for any personal motive or the representative of any particular interest, I pledge an energetic and honest service, with equal representation to all sections and interests.

"I advocate fewer laws, guaranteeing opportunity to private business, protection to labor, and adequate old age benefits to those entitled to them. Every home, either within a city or upon a farm, is entitled to protection from confiscation by taxation or pilferage by the lawless. Our natural resources and new industries must be conserved and encouraged.

"My experience in the practical application of law is vital to a representative. I submit my candidacy on the basis of my qualifications."

Marshfield Has \$45,000 Fire

The Coquille fire department was asked to come to Marshfield last Thursday noon, just after the Sentinel had gone to press to assist in controlling the mill fire which was threatening the Marshfield business section. At that time the two Bay departments had not been able to control the fire, with a strong wind from the north, scattering embers on the hill to the west and over the business section to the south.

The fire started in what is known as the old Conrad mill, which was owned by Butler Bros., and was being operated by Lyons & Irwin, and the mill was destroyed in a few moments.

The old Ferguson freight building on Broadway below the mill also burned as did the J. V. Koski garage. The telephone cable containing 100 pairs of wires for 350 feet was melted. The total loss is figured at between \$40,000 and \$45,000.
