Aztec calendar at Xochimilco; with its Sunday morning crowds, gay and festive flower-laden boats and music.

"I took a boat trip through the canals to inspect the Floating Gardens.

"In Puebla I visited the tile factory, a recently discovered convent, and attended mass at the lovely cathedral. One evening our party hired an old Victoria in which we were driven through the market district. The horses were old, the driver was old and the horses even older, but it was fun.

"The National Pawn Shop, run by the government, the Palace of Fine Arts, National Palace and the Cathedral of Mexico are places a tourist must 'do.'

"I attended the bullfights and enjoyed them; they are truly thrilling.

"I could not quite adjust myself to the eating and sleeping hours. Stores open at 9:30, closing at 7:30 in the evening, but every shop is closed from 1:00 to 4:00, which is the siesta hour. When evening comes, iron shutters are pulled down so you can't window shop. This is because there is no glass insurance in Mexico.

"The Mexican people are an astonishing handsome race. They are polite, gracious and charming to visitors, doing their utmost to make visits pleasant.

"The climate in Mexico City was much like ours, cool and at this time of year, it is having its rainy season.

"I was glad I was home when I read Monday's paper regarding the election riots, but again, I wish I had been there to see the excitement. The Palace of Fine Arts, scene of some rioting was just across the park from my hotel."

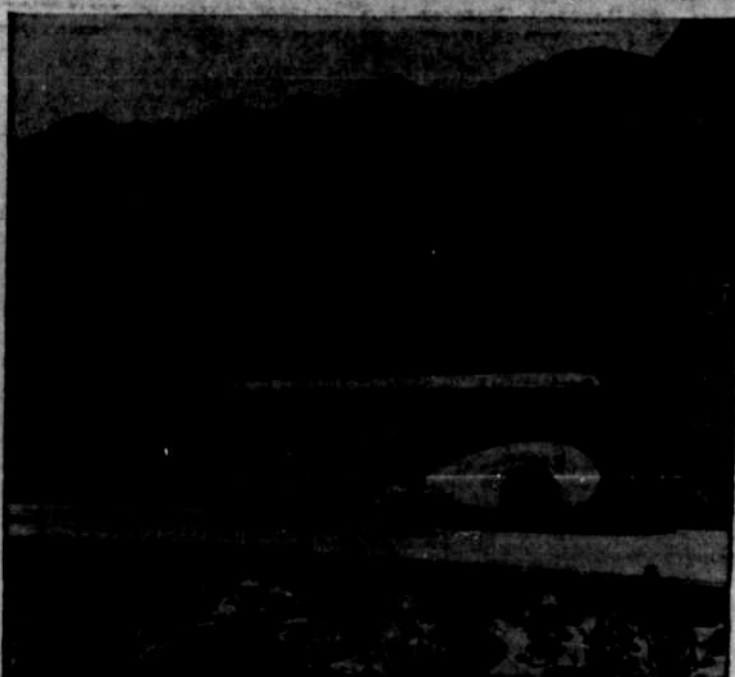
